

The following information are notes on the Alford Family that was collected by M.E. White when she wrote her book on Pine Springs, Lauderdale County, MS.

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THE ALFORD FAMILY

The Alford family originated in England but were among the early emigrants to America. Our story of the family starts with Jacob Alford who was born in Franklin County, North Carolina during the time the American Revolution was being fought in the 1770's. He was married around 1778-1800 to a local girl named Milberry, called Milbra, who was also born in that county in 1779.

Jacob and Milbra Alford had several children born in North Carolina with at least four of them being sons. They perhaps had daughters as well but records of them have not been uncovered.

The Alford's eldest son, Julius Alford, was married in North Carolina in 1825, just before Jacob moved his family to Greene County, Alabama. Jacob, believed to have been a shoemaker, may have seen how others were beginning to prosper by becoming planters and wanted to become a farmer. He bought land, cleared ground in Alabama and went into cotton production. His crop did well in the new soil and the Alfords stayed there for ten years until his boys were approaching the time to think of marriage.

Jacob Alford must have listened with interest when he heard that the Choctaw Indian lands in Mississippi, purchased by the government in 1830, was being opened for white settlement. His land in Greene County, while not completely 'worn out', had certainly slowed in production and he wasn't making as many cotton bales per acre as he had made in in the beginning. He was ready to go somewhere to find new ground to clear and to start over. His children, some already married, were wanting to start farms of their own. Yes, even though Jacob wasn't ~~that~~ that young any more, must have thought it was time to 'cut bait' and move on.

After the crop was gathered in the fall of 1836 and sent down-river to Mobile, Jacob collected his family and the family of his married sons, and they loaded their furniture, gear, chillun' and huntin' dogs into wagons and made the trip to Lauderdale County, Mississippi. Jacob bought land in the northwestern part of the new county in Sections 8 and 9 of Township 7, Range 15E. His married sons Julius and Owen bought land not too far away. Jacob bought 120 acres through the Government Land Office in Augusta, Mississippi, on October 24, 1836, paying \$1.25 and acre for it.

The Alfords did not own any slaves at the time they came to Mississippi but with several young men in the family, they were able to work together and soon had log cabins built and part of the land cleared so cotton could be planted the following spring. They had few neighbors; the closest were the Hatcher family

who had arrived that past May, and Gray Sanderford came with his family in November, a month after the Alford's. A mile through the woods to the east lived a family of Rodgers, 'old-timers' who had been there a couple years. The other side of the Kerleys and the Tutts on the south, Julius Alford, the older son, was able to lease some of the 16th Section school land, so he wasn't far away, about three quarters of a mile. Most of the land was still owned by the state or had been purchased by non-resident men of means or by those who formed 'Land Companies' / These didn't intend to live there but had bought the land as an investment. It was sparsely settled but the new folks keep coming and all were greeted and welcomed into the little community.

The settlers worked together to help each other and log-rollings and house-raising became a popular form of recreation. At all-day work parties the ladies brought dinner and would spend the afternoon seated in the shade while the men worked at whatever job that was to be accomplished that day. The women exchanged recipes and gossip as the men labored and the stalwarts showed off their strength before the young maidens - who pretended, of course, that they were not watching. A great time was generally had by all and by working together, much could be accomplished that would have been very hard for one lone fellow to do.

Jacob Alford lived in his new home in Mississippi just two years before he died in 1838. He was in his early 60's. and didn't leave much behind except his widow and children and some land; he hadn't been there long enough to make much money. At the time of his death most of his children were married except James and Sherrod. Today there is not a clue to tell us where he was buried; they may have started a family cemetery there in the woods that has been lost with the passage of time. There were no churches that had been started at that early date where he could have been buried.

After Jacob's death. the widow Milbra moved in with her bachelor son, Sherrod, who had bought 40 acres adjoining his father in 1837 (NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of NE $\frac{1}{4}$.Sec.8). James, married in 1840, moved into the old Alford cabin. In 1847 James Alford started selling off the land and by 1850 all the family had moved from Pine Springs. Some bought other lands in Lauderdale, but some of the family had left for parts unknown.

In 1860, Milberry & Sherrod H. Both lived near Marion in house with Walter and Roena Welch.

Milberry joined Fellowship Baptist Church Febr, 1838 — one of original memb.??

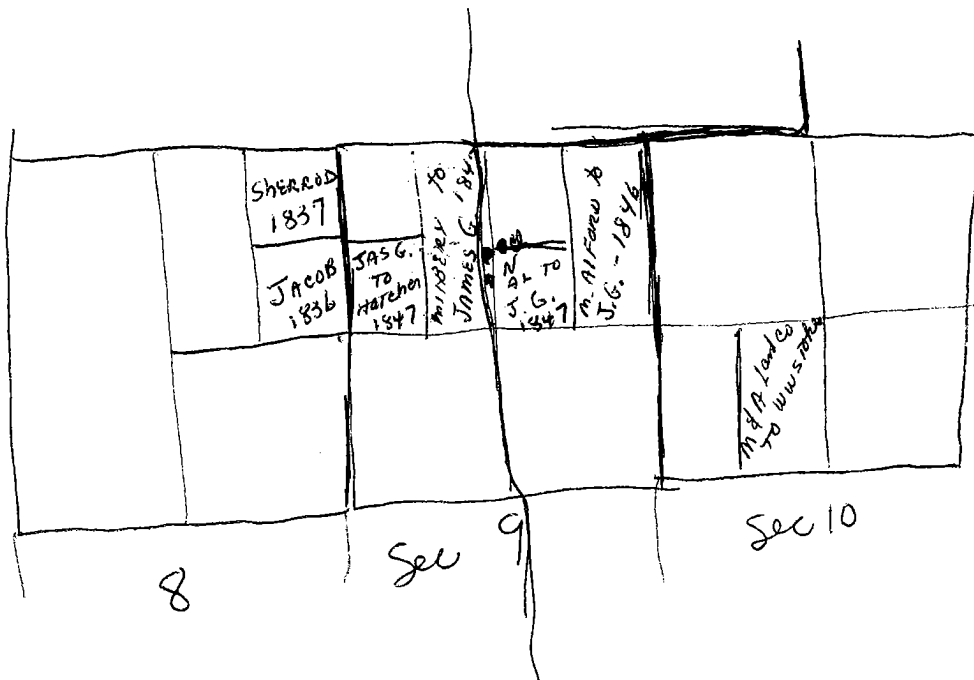

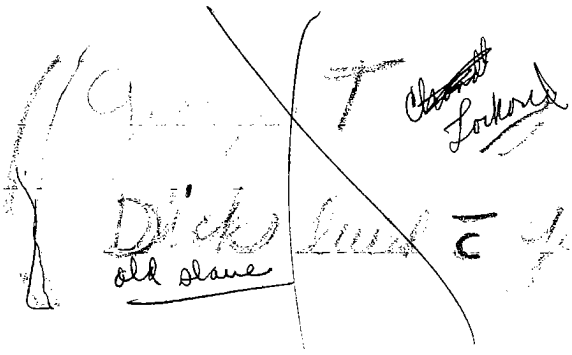
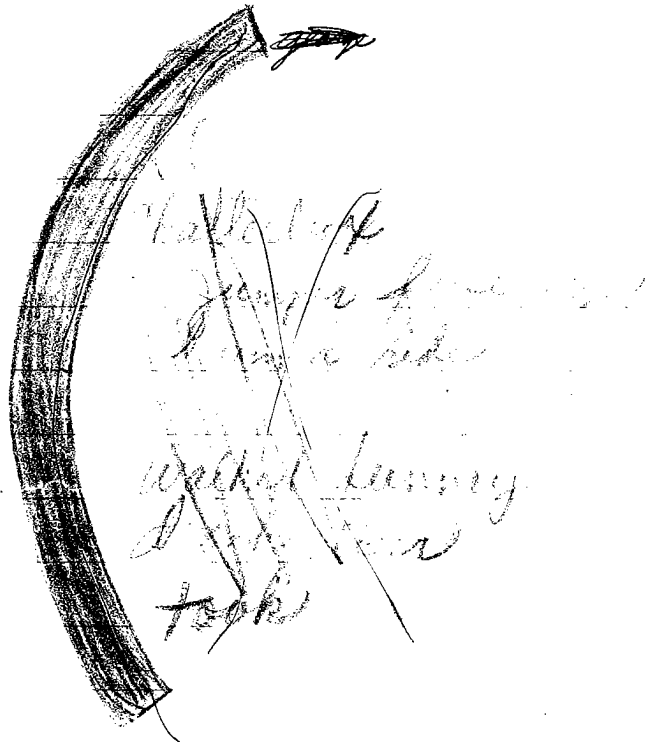

W. F. Alford, Marion, Miss., was born in Greene county, Ala., October 1, 1827, and is the eldest of a family of ten children. His parents, Julius and Sarah (Sanderford) Alford, were both natives of Franklin county, N. C.; there they grew to maturity and were married. Shortly after their marriage they removed to Greene county, Ala., where they resided ten years, and thence to Lauderdale county, Miss.; this was in 1836. Mr. Alford bought land from the government and engaged in planting. He built houses, cleared the land, and soon had a good portion of it under cultivation. He was a harness and shoemaker by trade and was also a cooper; however, he devoted the greater portion of his time to planting. His wife was a member of the Baptist church, but he was a member of no church. He met with a violent death in 1860, when he was killed by a falling tree. Mrs. Alford is still living and is now in her eighty-third year. For the past five years she has been totally blind. The Alford family originated in England but were among the early emigrants to America. W. F. Alford the subject of this notice, assisted his father until he was twenty-seven years old. At the age of twenty-nine years he was married to Miss Sarah C. Crawford, of Marengo county, Ala., a daughter of Rev. Andrew J. Crawford. Mr. Crawford was a noted minister of the Methodist Episcopal church. Mr. and Mrs. Alford have had born to them nine children, six of whom are living: Anna (wife of J. S. Ross), Alice (wife of Z. Y. Craver), Lulu (wife of Romeo Glasscock), Eliza (wife of Charles Early), Joseph and William A. The mother died at her home in Lauderdale county in 1870. Mr. Alford was married a second time, in 1872, to Mary E. Parke, a daughter of Benjamin F. Parke, a prominent business man of Lauderdale county. Five daughters were born to this union: Alatha, Virginia, Frances, Ellen, and one who died in infancy. Mr. Alford owns four hundred and twenty acres of land, two hundred being under cultivation. He has lived on this plantation for the past twenty-five years. In 1858 he was elected sheriff of Lauderdale county, and served in that capacity ten years. For four years before his election he was deputy sheriff. For five years he has served as treasurer of the county, and is the present incumbent of that office. He is a candidate for reelection in the fall of 1891. He has been constable and assessor of the county a number of times, and has been elected to public office a greater number of times than any other man in the county. He is a man of superior business qualifications, and has discharged his various duties with a fidelity that has won him the entire confidence of his constituency. He is a member of the Presbyterian church, and his wife belongs to the Methodist Episcopal church. He has been a member of the Masonic fraternity since 1850. He is a member of the Farmers' Alliance.

~~David J. Allen is a prosperous merchant and planter of Bolivar county, Miss., but was born in Grenada county of this state on the 14th of February, 1858, the sixth of seven children born to David A. and Elmina C. (Jones) Allen, natives of Mississippi and Tennessee respectively. David A. Allen was a merchant and planter, resided in this state for over forty years and died in Memphis, Tenn., in 1878 at the age of sixty years. He served in the Confederate army during the Civil war. The maternal grandfather, Isaac Jones, was one of the first settlers of the city of Memphis, Tenn., having removed there at a very early period. David J. Allen was educated in the schools of Memphis, his opportunities being well improved, and in 1876, at the age of eighteen years, he was better prepared than the average young man to fight the battle of life successfully. He began with no capital, received \$10 a month for his labors, but wisely spent his evenings in attending night school, where he perfected himself in bookkeeping. After graduating at Robinson & Leddar's business college in Memphis, he began keeping books in 1885, which occupation he followed for five years. At the end of this time he purchased an interest in the firm of J. W. Lyman~~

THE CHILDREN OF JACOB ALFORD

I. JULIUS ALFORD

Born; 1803, Franklin Co., N.C. Died; 1860, Lauderdale Co, Miss.
Married: Sarah Sanderford (b.1809NC) in Franklin Co, N.C., 1825. She was a relative (sister? aunt?) of Gray (b 1806) and Kemp (b 1815) Sanderford, brothers who had came to Lauderdale Co, Miss. in 1836.

Julius grew up in Franklin County, North Carolina, where he, the oldest son, was taught a trade. He learned from his father how to make shoes, harness and other leather goods; he also learned from somewhere how to be a cooper and could make casks and barrels.

When his father moved the family to Greene County, Alabama in 1826, Julius and his bride, young Sarah, also went along to start their new life together. Their firstborn, Warren, was born in Greene County in 1827. They lived there ten years and had two more children born in Alabama before the whole Alford clan migrated on to Mississippi in 1836.

It appears that they lived at first on land that old Jacob Alford bought in Lauderdale County (Pine Springs) when they first arrived, but they later bought (leased) land in the 16th Section school land [SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of NE quarter, Sec. 16, Township 7, Range 15E], less than a mile to the south. Julius cleared and cultivated his small farm, but he also continued to work with leather and to make barrels to get extra money.

In 1838, Enoch Holeman came to Julius and wanted to borrow \$400. Holeman must have needed money very badly because he put up just about everything he owned as security on the note. It turned out that Holeman couldn't pay the note, so Julius had to take the man's goods - his horse, a mule, furniture, and even his corn crop. That was on Nov. 1, 1839, a year after his father died.

On August 2, 1847, Julius and Sarah Alford sold their 16th Section land to Lawson Gunn. ~~They~~ moved over nearer the county seat at Marion. The other Alford's moved away at about the time.

In 1860, Julius Alford, 57 years old, met a violent death; he was killed by a falling tree. He did not belong to a church, but Sarah was a staunch Baptist, so he was likely buried somewhere near Marion in a Baptist Cemetery.

Sarah lived on to be nearly 90 years old at her death. She lost her sight and was blind for several years before she died.

In 1854 Warren Alford got a job as deputy sheriff and then was elected Sheriff of Lauderdale County in 1858, a post he held for ten years. It was said that in his time he was elected to public office a greater number of times than any other man in Lauderdale County. He was County Treasurer five years and Tax Assessor a number of times and had been a Constable at one time. He owned 420 acres of land, 200 of which was under cultivation, and he was a member of the Farmer's Alliance and of the Masonic Fraternity. He belonged to the Presbyterian Church, although his wife remained a Methodist. Children: (First six were Sarah's, the last five were Mary's.)

This son, in his thirties, was listed in the 1840 Lauderdale County Census with his wife and five children. There were no names being listed in the census that far back, but his oldest child was about ten years old. Owen also appears on the 1840-46 Poll Tax Lists for the county. He was not found in the county after 1846; apparently he either died or moved away. He was living in Lauderdale County but not in Pine Springs in 1840.

James was a young man, 24 years old, when he came to Pine Springs with his father in 1836. He married in 1840 and in 1847 he began buying out the others interest in Jacob Alford's estate, apparently to get a clear title to the land so they could sell it. All the Alfords left Pine Springs before 1850. James, Harriett and their three (oldest) children were listed in the 1850 Lauderdale County census, but not living in Pine Springs. We don't know where they went after 1850.

IV. SHERROD ALFORD

Bought 40 acres in Pine Springs in 1837, which was patented in 1841. He left the community around 1847 but appears in the Lauderdale County census in 1850, 34 years old, unmarried, with his old widowed mother living with him.

One wonders whatever became of him and if he ever got married. *In 1850 he + mom lived on eastern part of Co.*

[Jacob Alford more than likely had more descendants than I have listed here but this is all I have found in Lauderdale County to date. With the exception of Warren F. at Marion, very little is known of his grandchildren.

There was a James Alford born in 1854 in Lauderdale Co. that married Anna Pace, daughter of Bennet Rose Pace of Pine Springs on July 27, 1876; must have been a grandson of Jacob Alford's, but we have no clues as to which Alford was his father.

There also was a John C. Alford who sold Wilson D. Tutt 40 acres in Sec.22,T-7, R-16E (just north of Marion Station) in Dec.1838 [A-191]. Wilson G. and Richard B. Tutt were both buying bits of land in Lauderdale Co. in 1835-36. Richard owned 80 acres over on Rogers Creek in Pine Springs, Sec.9.]

NOTE: Some of the obituaries and some info floating around claim that the boys were born in Neshoba County, Mississippi. We think they may have lived in Neshoba County after James Henry Alford married Lue Martin in that county and that they may have been living there before the move to Texas, and been too young to remember the other place. The first three are clearly born in Lauderdale Co. If the 1890 census had not burned up, we would have had a clear fix of where they were living then. If we can ever find Annie Pace Alford's grave, that should establish where they were living. Supposedly there was a picture of Uncle Jack standing by her grave when he visited Mississippi in the 1950's, so he must have known where she is buried and apparently it was marked. I'm still searching for this and for tax records, if they owned property. If they were only renting, we may be out of luck.

First of all, thank you for researching and writing about the Pine Springs community. I purchased a copy a year or so ago and immediately spread word to my other Pace and Alford relatives that they needed to buy a copy. Being a member, I also sent Zerox pages of the Alford info to the Alford American Family Association.

Secondly, an extra big thank you for placing your draft and research notes in the Archives. I only saw them on December 6 on my way back from a re-search trip to Greene Co., Alabama. I placed a set of my Family Group Sheets with the Archives with the hope you would take a look. If we are connected to Jacob and Milberry, I for one have found no proof as yet. We do seem to be following the same trail though. Jacob may have been an uncle to my John Madison Alford.

Helen Leary was at our AAFA meeting in Raleigh, N. C. She said our problem is that we all used the same names and we just have to backtrack and follow all the lines. I'm trying to come up with that self-discipline.

Well I think our John is the one in Pickens Co., Alabama in 1830. But there are at least two more Johns coming through there about then, and Pickens is a burned-out county. No wills in probate exist before 1871, according to the DAR. The oldest son said he was born in North Carolina. John Madison keeps insisting on every census that he was born in Georgia. No proof yet. JMA's son George Washington Alford had a bunch of family records at one time (before I became interested) but before anyone organized them and made copies, they were all destroyed in a house fire. One family lore says GWA and his wife Mollie came to Texas with her father Charles R. Warren. I'm not sure if my greatgrandfather James Henry Alford and his family came then; I've found some GWA and JHA lore mixed up. And the old obituaries are not exactly true.

Charles R. Warren was born in Georgia in 1826, and died December 5th, 1921, aged 95 years and 7 months. He was the second son of Mose Warren, was reared on a farm and moved from Georgia with his parents to Marengo County, Alabama, when but a boy four years old. He lived seven years in Alabama, then moved to Kemper County, Miss., in the fall of 1833. While in Kemper County he was married to Miss Judith E. Bruton in March, 1848. To this union were born thirteen children, six of whom are now living, together with forty grandchildren and fifty-three great-grandchildren. His wife died before he moved to Texas from Mississippi. At the age of thirty-five he enlisted in the Confederate Army and was made 1st Lieutenant. In 1864 he was discharged for disability. He joined the Primitive Baptist Church when eighteen years of age. Brother Warren was a deacon before he came to Texas, then served the church at Joshua, Texas, as deacon and clerk for many years. The writer was associated with him about thirty-five years, and I never knew a more exemplary christian man in all my time among the Old Baptists. Deacon Warren lived a quiet, peaceable life, in all godliness and honesty. He was an old landmark Baptist, and stood firm on the Black Rock

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and London confession of faith when they were denounced as heresy by men who had never been sound in the faith of God's elect, but who drifted off into conditionalism. When ninety years of age he attended his meetings regularly all alone, but for several years he was too feeble to attend. The writer was not called to see him until he became speechless, therefore had no talk with him. Brother Warren came to Texas in 1882, and settled in Cleburne, Johnson County, making his home with his daughter, Mrs. D. Lockett, for several years.

He, being a member of the old Confederate Camp, the writer conducted a memorial service in the old soldiers' hall at the courthouse the third Sunday in December, 1921. The text of Scripture used on the occasion was Revelation xiv. 13. The remains were laid to rest in the Cleburne cemetery.

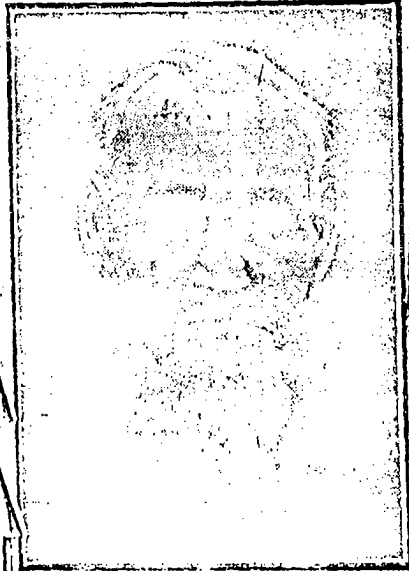
