

THE CLARK FAMILY #I

There were several different Clark (or Clarke) families that came early to Lauderdale County. By 1850 there were 6 Clarks here from Tennessee, South Carolina, Alabama and North Carolina.

The Clark that came to Pine Springs in 1846 and bought the north half of the southwest quarter of Section 3 from Alexander McMillen was Thomas S. W. Clark,

Thomas S. W. Clark had been born in North Carolina in 1813. His wife, Emaline, was a native of Tennessee, where she had been born in 1824. It is not known where they met and married, but their oldest child, William A. Clark, was born in Mississippi, in 1844. In 1846 he bought his first land in Pine Springs, and his name appears on the 1848 Poll Tax List in the county. The list also reveals that he owned no slaves.

By 1850, Thomas Clark was able to buy 80 more acres in Section 3 (E $\frac{1}{2}$  of NW  $\frac{1}{4}$ ) from J.P. Dement of Marion. He appears in the 1850 census, living in Pine Springs with Emmaline, William A., and two more children, James R., who was 4 and little Elizabeth, who was three that year. Living in the house with him is a young single man, William Stringer, who was 20 years old. Stringer may have been a relative, or he may have been a hired man.

In 1851, Thomas S.W. and Emmaline Clark sold their land in Section 3 to Aaron Jones, the new Methodist preacher. They moved away from Pine Springs, and they do not appear in the 1860 Lauderdale County census. Apparently they left the county. There was another Clarke that came later and bought land in Section 5 of Pine Springs, but it is not known if they were related to Thomas S.W. Clark or not.

## THE CLARK FAMILY # II

There was a family of orphaned Clark children living with their uncle in Obediah in 1880. The names of their parents have been forgotten and lost. Their mother may have been a Williams, because their uncle was listed in the census that year as 69 year old Jacob William, who was born in South Carolina in 1811. His 29 year old unmarried sister, Ann Williams, was living with them. Also in the house was his widowed sister, Mary Brown, (66) and her daughter, Louisa Brown (38). The five Clark children's ages (his niece and nephews) ranged from six to sixteen. Apparently their parents had died within the past six years.

In the early 1900's, Earle Clark, the youngest of the orphans, moved to Pine Springs and located in the southeast quarter of Section 5. The Old Slough Creek came through the back side of Joel New's farm and veered westward as it entered the Clark land. Over a period of long years the Slough cut through a hill on Clark's place and formed a steep, sheer bluff, approximately 60 feet high. This bluff was called "Clark's Bluff", a name that it still has today.

Earle Clark was a bathelore; he never married, so they say. Born in 1874, he was raised by his old uncle and two aunts. When he came of age, he joined the Army and fought in the Spanish American War in Cuba. People who are alive today who remember him from their childhood, say that he had the reputation of being a mean, bad-tempered man who was given to drink. There was a rumor that he had once killed a man, but nobody seemed to know the details. At one time Earle put out the word that he was "toting a gun for Joel New". Whatever his grievance was with Mr. New was not revealed, and as people that knew Mr. New as a good neighbor and a fair man, could think of nothing that would have caused a conflict between them. But nothing ever came of the threat and it was soon forgotten.

For some reason, Earle Clark dropped from sight, and in his place came his older brother, Joe Clark, and took up residence at the Clark house. Joe Clark was married and had children, and made a better neighbor. He appears that his personality was somewhat different from his brother's.

After a few years, Kirby Smith, who lived out on the Pine Springs Road, bought the farm from Joe Clark. Smith's brothers, Sid and Joe Smith each lived in the old Clark house and farmed the back fields (sharecropped) at one time. In later years, the land was sold to the U.S. Government when the Okatibbee Reservoir was being built in the 1960's.

Today, the Clark's Bluff still stands. It is located at the eastern end of the dam that forms the lake, and picnic pavilions are now enjoyed where the old Clark house used to be. The bluff makes a sheer drop off to the edge of the lake water.
