The earliest record of James W and Ava were that they were living in 1830 in Wilcox Co. Ala. The first land grant for James W was in 1 Aug 1831 Centificate #7445 for land E.\(\frac{1}{2}\) of the N.W.\(\frac{1}{2}\) of Section 20 in Township 11 of Range 7 containing 80 acres of land. This grant was signed by President Andrew Jacks\(\frac{1}{2}\)

James W sold this land 15 of May 1834 to Mary Hails & Harriet Hails. Robert M. Hails payed \$200.00 to James W for this land before he deceased. Robert M. Hails is the father of Mary and Harriett Hails.

James W also received a land grant in 1 Aug 1831 with Aaron Mathews certifical #7443 for land in S.W. Section 30 in Township 11 of Range 8 for 159 Acres of land. This grant was signed by Andrew Jackson also (Walang Gale)

Then James W moved to Meridian Miss in 1834 later went back to Sumter Co. Ala and bought land from the the government for investment. This land located in Section 30 Township 15 Range 2W. This land contained 80 acres of land. This land grant #6889 dated 14 March 1835. Signed by President Martin Van Buren. James sold this land to Robert Littlepage for \$400.00.

In 1837 James W received a land grant Certificate #27053 from President Martivan Buren. This land located in S.W.& of the S.E. & of Section 30 in Township 11 of Range 8 containing 39.98 of acre. This land is in Wilcox Co., Ala., all I have failed to receive the land deed where James W sold this land and the that he had with Aaron Mathews.

James W children: Nancy and W.H., were born in Ala but have failed to find to Co. John and James Monroe were born in Wilcox Co Ala. Thomas Marion and Amanda and Mary Jane all born at Lost Gap (Meridian) Miss.

James W's family has several sets of twins. His family has several sets of double cousins. Several cousins married their cousins.

/James W great grandson Harlan Huddlin (Dan) Daniel is the author of the book His great great grandson Jimmy Dear is the publisher of the book.

The history of Wilcox Co Ala where James W Daniel family lived.
Wilcox Co. formed in Dec. 13 1819 from Monroe and Dallas Co. It lies in the SW1 of the State S. and E. of Marengo, S and SW of Dallas, W of Butler, north of Monroe and NE of Clarke. It was named for Lt. Joseph M. Wilcox. The land is rolling, often hilly, but with much that is flat. The land consist mostly of prairie. The Ala. River flows through it for 62 miles. I think that is the way James W Daniel came from Tenn. to Wilcox Co is by the Ala. River and then back to Sumter Co., Ala., by this river. Camden is the County Seat. If 1830 when James W lived in Wilcox Co., Camden was called Bachomville. In Fel 1814, Col. Russell marched his regiment from Fort Claiboine to the Cohaba River to drive the Indians from this county.

Later, I*ll get limited official documentation to go along with what we now have BUT it's more than enough to make the "Old Gilbert Cemetery" cleaning a must.

Joey and I spent 5 hours on a cleaning trip and only cleaned about an eight of the cemetery as some of the graves are scattered or possibly some spaces are unmarked graves. A careful study of all the tomstones in the enclosed cemetery records, show 3/4 to be relations and I suspect the Gilberts are related on the "Kittrell" line. We have failed to locate the grave of Nancy Daniel. In the "Daniel" book publication it states she is also buried there. If, after, cleaning we locate her grave or any others I'll mail them to you. Did not mean to get so carried away and so long winded. We're taking before and after pictures at the cemetery and will do the same at the "Key" cemeteries. We collect pictures of family tombstones.

I always as a hobby researched my Mothers side of the family. The Whitlock, Skelton, Turnage, Gay, and Dowell maternal family lines have been in Lauderdale County since the middle 1800's and earlier. Edward S. Key published 3 "Key Family" books on my paternal family lines and did such a great job that I have done little research on these family branches... Key, Ward, Hand, and Warren. The "Key" family re-union (3 days in Aug.) in DeKalb will include a day of cleaning "Key" cemeteries. Of course my son, Joey, and I volunteered for the Cemetery cleaning. By continuing our work at the "Gilbert" cemetery we should be well in practice for the event.

Even though I knew something of the Daniel family history. I have done little research there as my first husband and I divorced several years ago and he later re-married. HOWEVER, THE DANIEL TOMBSTONES AT "THE OLD GILBERT CEMETERY" WERE IRRESISTABLE. To add to and verify my personal knowledge, I phoned Thomas Ellis Daniel, my first husbands father, in Chattanooga. He moved from Lauderdale County to Chattanooge about 1945 and has lived there since. Hers 88, 1 of 9 children, and his memory is fair. To double check his parents names and other pertinent data, I also phoned his sister, Iva Sanderford McCrory here in Meridian. She and Ellis agreed on their parents data and most of other information. Their help led me to the book published by Harlan Huddlin (Dan) Daniel, titled "The James W. Daniel- Family History of Miss.". A copy of this book is in the Meridiah Public Library.

I'm sending you a few zeroxed pages of this book as it will give you THE HISTORY OF THE "OLD GILBERT CEMETERY" WHOSE RECORDS I me enclosing. Thought you might enjoy this. You can discard all but the cemetery records.

In brief-

This is our "Daniel" family line in DIRECT decendence..

This whole thing started when I phoned George Robert Fairchild of Fairchild Rd., Lost Gap Community. He's an old school mate of mine. I asked him if he knew of any really old cemeteries in the Lost Gap area where there might be Turnages buried. He said yes and gave me directions off in the woods where we searched for almost an hour before locating the cemetery. course phoned Duane Maust, the current owner of that property for permission. He verified the fact that the cemetery existed. So-o guess who is cleaning "The Old Gilbert Cemetery" when time permits... It truly is a thick jungle like wilderness. In the beginning, my son Joey and I were shocked at the fact no family members cleaned and maintained the cemetery. We did not realize they were our relations at that time. The elaborate old tombstones and Confederate stones are lovely. On our first trip in we copied as many tombstones as we could locate but found no Turnages. After returning home, it took me some few days to really examine the cemetery data and attempt to identify them. The following is the very surprising results. A maternal Geat Uncle and Great Aunt of mine were: Eligah Arthur "Lige" Turnage and Ava Missouri "Zudie" Bounds Turnage. In the enclosed cemetery records, the Richard Daniel Bounds and wife, Avarill are the parents of "Zudie" Bounds Turnage. Daniel Addison Bounds is (in Cemetery records) the brother of "Zudie" Bounds Turnage. He is buried beside his wife, Sibbie Wilson Bounds. I phoned Eloise (MN) Turnage

Burke, a daughter of "Zudie" Bounds Turnage to make

sure I was correct on that.

THE JAMES W. DANIEL FAMILY - HISTORY OF MISSISSIPPI

James W. Daniel's family moved to Meridian, Miss. in 1834. The home place is located West of <u>Meridian at Lost Gap</u>, north of Highway 80 in Lauderdale County.

The old Gilbert Cemetery is on the Daniel Estate and Union Hill school was on the property in the old days. James W., Ava, his wife; John, his son; and Nancy, his daughter, are all buried in the Estate. Today Meridian Memorial Park, for white, and Sunset Memorial Park, for colored, are a part of the Estate.

Lauderdale County was established in 1833. It is 677 Square Miles. She was first named in honor of Col. James Lauderdale of the War of 1812. The first County Seat was located at Marion until 1866; then moved to Marion Station until 1870; then to Meridian is still the County Seat for Lauderdale County.

Lauderdale County's first temple of Justice was a giant red oak tree. The giant red oak tree was struck by lightning in 1915. There was an opening large enough for an adult man to stand up in. There was a Mrs. Brook and Mrs. Cochran who visited the red oak tree. Mrs. Brooks took a piece of the wood from the tree; had a Mr. Charles Mapp make a gravel from the piece of wood. It is marked in Sterling Silver.

The first court session of Lauderdale County was in 1841. The presiding Judge was Judge Henry Mounger. The first case was a man tried for murder. He was found to be guilty of murder. Then the first newspaper was established in 1859 by Mr. W.B. Spinks.

Meridian became a legal corporation in 1860. The first elected mayor was J.H. Gibbs. The first aldermen were: I.S.O.G. Grser, W.J. Berry, M. Massengale, and John T. Ball in 1865. John T. Ball secured the first Post Office by the name of Meridian.

✓ In 1864, General W.P. Sherman of the Federal army raided Meridian. They destroyed the railroad, grist mills and homes.

James W. Daniel's 4 sons served in the War of 1861 to 1865. Thompson Marion was the youngest son and was killed in the war.

The first liquor election was held in 1886. The results were that it was prohibited; then the second election was in 1888-voted wet. A saloonist and an officer of the city government carried negroes at night and registered them to vote, gave them a whiskey ticket tied up in a handkerchief and told them to keep it until the election day, then put it in the voting box.
