THE RICHARDSON FAMILY

RANSOM C. RICHARDSON was born December 19, 1809 in Johnston County, North Carolina, in the east central part of the state. He married a Johnston County girl, Lucinda O'Neal, on October 2, 1833. Lucinda had been born on October 30, 1815, so she would have been 18 years old when they married. Richard O'Neal acted as bondsman for the couple.

There were members of the Richardson family living on both sides of the county line between Johnston adn Wake Counties. It is unknown to which of these Richardson families that Ransom Richardson belonged. Several of the North Carolina Richardsons migrated on to Alabama, settling in Greene,

Sumter and Pickins Counties.

A story that has been passed down in the Richardson family is about when they left North Carolina. According to the story, the Richardson's wagons were all packed and ready to leave for their new home the next morning, on the night that the stars fell. They must have taken this as a good omen, for the migration began the next morening on schedule. The historical event of the stars falling was supposed to have happened on Maymember 13, 1833.

Ransom and Lucinda Richardson arrived in Lauderdale County, Mississippi one Thursday night two years later in September, 1835. They stayed in Lauderdale County - they had to. One of their horses got sick and they

could not go on. They slept that night in their wagon .

The next morning they were rested and looked about at the land where they had camped. It seemed like pretty good land where they were and water was nearby, so they thought they might as well stay right where they were. Ransom staked a claim and bought the land from the Columbus Land Office. there were no near neighbors, but soon other families came in and specific before long they had a community going. There was a beautiful all-year spring near their home that they named Drip-off Springs. The community where Ransom Richardson bought his long called Drive Called D He built a lean-to for Lucinda and baby Bryant, and there they stayed. At spring near their home that they named Drip-off Springs. The community where Ransom Richardson bought his land was named for the spring and was called Drip-off Community. [A hundred years later the community was called Center Hill, named for the consolidated school that was built about two miles west of the Richardson's homeplace.]

In April of 1838, on the Saturday before the second Sunday, there was a meeting held over at Ben Carpenter's home to organize a Baptist church. Lucinda Richardson became a member of that church, which was named Fellowship. When the church members divided in 1849 over differences in their beliefs, Lucy stayed with the church at Gumlog. Random wouldn't join

either faction of the Baptists.

Ransom Richardson bought and sold land about the county until he had acquired several hundred acres. On April 13, 1843, he sold Gray Sanderford of Pine Springs 159 acres in Sec. 23, Township 8, Range 15E for \$349. It was said that upon his death, he was able to leave each of his eleven children a small farm. He was on 1858 land tax roll for 440 acres in S-26, T-8, R-15E.

Ransom outlived Lucy by 37 years, but he never found the Gumlog cemetery beside Lucy. His will is recorded in Lauderdale County.

Ransom C. Richardson's youngest child, Ransom S., moved to Pine Springe in 1909. His grandson, Sam'l D. Kinerd, moved there in 1000

Ransom and Bunnie bought 40 acres of land in Section 3 of Pine Springs from Spinks M. Jones on November 13,1909. It was the land adjoining Ransom's nephew, Sam Kinard. Ransom died on Christmas Day, four years later in 1913 at the age of 53. He left Bunnie with five children when

he died, two of them were minors.

Bunnie stayed on the little farm until the spring of 1919 when she sold it to Wallace and Ruby Lang. The Langs were living in Meridian at that time, where Wallace was employed at a buggy factory. They never did move to Pine Springs. They sold the land to Sam Kinard in the fall of the same year they bought it.

Bunnie lived until 1955. She did not marry again.

RICHARDSON FAMILY-RECORD

Ransom C. Richardson, Married Incinda O'Neal, 2 October 1853, in Johnston County, North Carolina. (Richardson O'Neal was a Bondsman, so he probably is her father, or a brother????)

The Richardson's (some of them) lived both sides of the County Line, between Wake County, North Carolina and Johnston County, North Carolina.

According to F.H. Richardson, of Ruston, La. Many Richardson's went to Alabama. (Green, Sumpter, and Pickins Counties). Some accounts say that some were all packed and ready to go on the night the Stars Fell. Supposedly this was 13 Sept. 1833. According to the Encyclopedia, 1835 was a year of Exceptionally Bright Meteoric Showers.

Family Tradition has it that Ransom Richardson, arrived in Lauderdale County, Sept. 1835. Which was a Thursday night. Ransom had to stop, because their herse got sick. He Built a Lean-To for his family and it was there they settled. This place was across from the old Talbert Home Place, in Drip-Off Springs. Now known as the Center Hill-Bailey Community.
