

His will was made 19 April, 1831, and filed 28 Nov., 1831, in Franklin Co., Ohio (Will Book Liber A, f. 211). In it he names his wife Mary; son Joshua, daughters Hannah and Matilda, grandchildren William Derick, Mary Ann Taylor, and Susan and Rebecca Derick; grandson John Stevenson of John, sons Zachariah, Richard and George, and daughters Rachel Hooper, Sarah Algire, Mary Peterson, Anna Kalb, and Elizabeth wife of Nathan Stevenson.

DAA. JOHN STEVENSON, of John and Mary, was b. ----, and d. 27 Dec., 1830, age 52 (sic!) at his farm in Baltimore Co., of a pulmonary disease. The funeral was from Evans Meeting House (his obituary in Baltimore Gazette and Daily Advertiser 28 Dec., 1830). He m. Rebecca, daughter of Daniel Evans, who d. 1812 (see Evans' will, Balto. Co. Wills 9:250).

Stevenson was Sheriff and Tax-collector of Baltimore Co.

Notes by Thos. E. Sears at the Maryland Historical Society include a letter to Sears from Eleanor B. Reilly of Baltimore stating that Sheriff John's sister m. her cousin Nathan Stevenson.

Marriage License issued 14 Feb.), Mary, daughter of Thomas and Sarah Boone, b. 23 March, 1763; d. 13 Jan., 1835. They lived together in wedlock for 51 years, 10 months, and 29 days.

E. MARY STEVENSON, of Edward and Mary, was b. ----, and d. ----. She m. ca. 1714, George Brown. In Recollections of an Itinerant Life, by Rev. George Brown, D.D., the author describes his grandfather, George Brown who m. Mary Stevenson, as a native of England, about 5 feet, 1 inch in height, and strongly built. George and Mary settled at Pipe Creek, Frederick Co., where George died ca. 1770.

In 1727, George Brown petitioned the Baltimore County Court that he had not received a share (in right of his wife Mary) of the estate of Edward Stevenson, his wife's father. He mentioned Henry Sater, who m. Stevenson's widow Mary, and who was not distributing the estate properly. Sater, when summoned to appear before the court, replied that he was so troubled with boils that he could not ride to court, but would appear as soon as possible (notes copied by Mrs. Rogers from Box 33, folder 15, at the Hall of Records).

Brown must have received some sort of settlement, eventually, since Robert Boone of Anne Arundel County, in his will made 1758; filed 1759, mentions 256 acres of "Edwards and Wills Valleys and Hills" which he had purchased from George Brown. (This of course was one of the original tracts patented by Edward Stevenson).

In 1743, Brown patented two tracts in what is now Carroll County, Md: 350 acres "Brown's Delight"; and 50 acres "Pleasant Grove". In 1761, he patented 565 acres of "Brown's Plague"; a resurvey on "Brown's Delight" (from notes by Dr. Tracey on Carroll County Land Patents; a microfilm at the Md. Hist. Soc.).

George Brown made his will, 19 Feb., 1767. It was filed for probate 24 Feb., 1770 (Fred. Co. Wills, Liber A # 1, f. 358). The executors were his wife Mary, and his son Henry. His son John was to receive "Pleasant Grove" in Baltimore County. His children George, Edward, Mary, Richard, and Elizabeth were to have 1 shilling each. Daughter Rachel was to have 1 feather bed and furniture (i.e., the draperies that hung around the bed). Children William, Henry, Hugh and Joshua were to divide "Brown's Plague" after the death of George's wife Mary.

On 27 June, 1797, John Brown of Baltimore County conveyed to John Algire, Richard Brown, George Epaugh, and William Chenoweth, 1 acre of "Pleasant Grove" in order for the Methodists, Episcoplians, Presbyterians, and Regular Baptists to build a joint Meeting house for worship (Balto. Co. Deeds, Liber WG # 53, f. 72).

Respected Father: After my respects to yourself and family and assurance of our health, I write to ~~you~~ you to purchase as much salt as will last for about 18 months or more, as that article is likely to be very high -- in consequence of a National result from the British which has aroused the indignation of city and county -- about nine thousand people assembled at the Court House on Monday last on the occasion. Many people in Baltimore would not sell salt nor buy ~~flour~~ flour on Monday. I notice in a Baltimore paper this week that a bill has been presented by the Grand Jury at Richmond, Virginia, against Aaron Burr for high treason, and stated he is in irons. I have no reply as yet for my letter containing money I sent to you on the 14th day of May --- Our love to you all; Your obedient son; Samuel Peters.

2, dated 13 August, 1808, from Fairfield Co., Ohio, from Daniel Stevenson, to Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Peters of Manchester, Maryland.

I wish to meet all my engagements and square up everything possible this coming autumn. --- We are all well, thanks to Providence for His great goodness. I wish if it were possible for you both to ~~come~~ come to Ohio this Fall and visit us and see the country. And if you will bring my little granddaughter Rachel, I will be glad. --- Mary, my daughter, your Mother sends her love to you and the children and wants to know if you ever intend to come out here? --- Your affectionate father and mother Daniel Stevenson

3, dated 2 August, 1809, from Fairfield Co., Ohio, Daniel Stevenson to Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Peters, of Manchester, Maryland.

Dear Children: This is to inform you that through the tender mercies of God I reached home in good health on the 21st day of July, and found all well, ~~excepting~~ excepting my dear wife, who has been very ill during my absence, and was thought to be very near death, but thanks be to God, she is recovering, and the rest are reasonably well. We are all hoping this will find you and yours in good health. I have been looking over my accounts and find that Mr. Storm's money has not yet come to hand. Please look over your books for me. Our best wishes to you and yours --- Your affectionate father, Daniel Stevenson (P.S.) When I reached here the 21st my corn was between 8 and 10 feet high, had some roasting ears. Please to write very often. Father.

4, dated 5 Feb., 1811, from Mordecai Stevenson, at Lancaster, Ohio, to his sister, Mrs. Mary Peters, at Manchester, Maryland.

Dear Sister Mary: I am sorry that the great distance which separates us is the means of depriving me of the happiness of your company, but thankful for an opportunity of communicating by the pen; in this manner we can ~~mmmm~~ converse lot the distance be ever so great. My affection and love go with this though I stay behind. Our Father, Mother & all of this family are well & I hope these few lines may find you and your family well. When we ~~mmmm~~ separated I intended to write a few lines upon my return home and did so althou~~gh~~ I never rec'd a reply. I have never known the cause & have not heard from you until this last letter by express which has caused me to feel sorry. Sister Leah was married to the amiable and much respected John Hamson, Esq. Brother Edward was married to the much accomplished daughter of Esquire Ijams, whose given name is Comfort; brother Daniel, Sally, and myself are still living in single blessedness, three out of ten. I reached home in ten days (no, sixteen) after I left you, laid by five days and a half out of that. There is a ~~probability~~ probability of my coming to your part of the country again in the Spring. So I will conclude my letter by sending you both my love. Your unworthy Brother, Mordecai Stevenson.

5, dated 28 May, 1811, from Leah and John Hampson, Pleasant twp., Fairfield Co., Ohio, to Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Peters at Manchester.

Dear Brother and Sister: I take this opportunity to inform you that we are all well. Thanks be to Almighty God for His Blessings. - and we trust this will find yourselves and your family of children all in the same state of health. We have not heard from you this long while living at so great a distance from you we would have great satisfaction if you would write by return of post to Lancaster Ohio. Father and Mother and all our brothers are well excepting Mordecai has a very sore throat, and has been quite ill for some time but now we hear he is better. Jesse, Edward, and George are very well. Edward has moved from Fathers. We live about four miles from Fathers. We are all anxious to hear from Brothers John and Satyr and all others whom we count upon our list of friends. - Please to excuse our short letter. Father and Mother are so anxious to hear from you all. From your affectionate brother and sister; Leah ~~Hampson~~ Hampson; John Hampson.

(a notice dated 27 Feb., 1812, printed in Hanover (Penna.), by Starck and Lange, stated that Samuel Peters was intending to remove to the Western country, and would auction off his tavern, Sign of the Cross Keys, in Manchester, Md., with about 5 acres of land, as well as other property).

#6, dated 25 March, 1812, from Daniel Stevenson, Richland twp., Fairfield Co., Ohio, to Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Peters at Manchester.

Respected Son and Daughter: I once more embrace this favorable opportunity of letting you know that we all, at this date, do enjoy

a reasonable share of health. Yours was received this evening in which we have satisfaction in hearing that you are all alive. As to your request of my meeting you at Wheeling, would say mmm the is out of my power. The Boys are all away and my team of horses are broken up. --- I wish you to write every opportunity when you are on the road and direct to care of Mr. Thomas James this side of Rush Creek. And if I can possibly will try to meet you at Zanosvill- No more, but my love to you both. Daniel Stevenson, Sen. --- To Henry (the 15 year old son of Samuel and Mary (Stevenson) Potors), from your old grandmother. I have some hope that I shall see once more, and if I do it will be no more than what I have often wished f: I want you to bring Grandma one half dozen tin picks, My affection and love go with this though I stay behind. Ruth Stevenson

A. EDWARD STEVENSON - see pp 4 ff. - 15 Sept., 1755; the deposition of Edward Stevenson, aged 52 years... states that about 27 years ago he was employed as a deputy by Mr. Philip Jones, Jr., then surveyor of Baltimore County, and about that time was mmmmm called to make a layout of land for Thomas Lusby of Anne Arundel County, by John Parrish of this county, now deceased.

APPENDIX # 2

Notes on unidentified Stevensons

MERRYMAN STEVENSON - 28 Nov., 1803; took oath of office as deputy sheriff of Frederick Co., Md., before John Wampler. Certificate Recorded 5 Dec., 1803; (Frederick Co. Deeds WR # 25, f. 204.).

MORDECAI STEVENSON - 11 Dec., ~~1787~~ 1787 - a petition was read in the House of Delegates, from Mordecai Stevenson, stating that he is blind and unable to provide for a large family, and prays exemption from paying taxes. The matter was referred to Mr. Ridgely, Mr. Craufurd, Mr. John Sanoy, and Mr. Burgess to consider and report on. (Votes and Proceedings of the House of Delegates, November Session, 1787)

MOSES STEVENSON - 2 Nov., 1799, Moses Stevenson bound his 19 year old son, Shaddick (Shadrack?), who would be 19 Feb., 17, next, to Samuel Anderson, to learn the trade of cabinet maker until 21 years old. (Baltimore Co. Orphans Court, Liber 2, f. 283)
