EDWARD STEVENSON, the Immigrant, was b. _____, and d. 1716 (new style), in Baltimore Co., Md., leaving a widow, Mary (_____) Stevenson, who m. 2) Henry Sater of Baltimore Co.

Just when Edward made his appearance in the Province of Maryland is not definitely known, as there seems to have been an Edward Stevenson living in Talbot Co. about the same time as our Edward. The two may have been related.

We do know that on 15 October, 1671, Thomas Todd claimed land for transporting one Edward Stevenson, and 23 other persons, into the province (Liber 16, f. 394; State Land Office, Annapolis). On 20 March, 1678, Andrew Price of Talbot Co. assigned his land rights to Edward Stevenson also of the same county (Liber 15, f. 563; Land Office).

Our Edward was a witness to the will of Roland Thornborough of Baltimore Co., on 25 July, 1695 (Md. Cal. Wills 2:111).

On 27 September, 1707, Ralph Stevenson of Talbot Co. made a will in which he named his brother Edward Stevenson. Earlier, Thomas Bruff of Baltimore Co. made a will in which he named his daughter Mary, wife of Ralph Stevenson (Md. Cal. Wills 2:246).

Although there seems to be a connection between the two Stevenson families, further research will have to be done before any valid conclusions can be drawn.

Our Edward must have been a man of some social position, for he is referred to as Edward Stevenson, gent., when in March of 1709/10, he, along with Major Thomas Hammond and William Talbot, was ordered by the Baltimore County Court to view the Garrison Road, so that it might be located to the most convenience of the inhabitants. (Marye, Wm. B., "The Baltimore County Garrison" Md. His. Mag., 16:233, Sept., 1921). In the same article it is pointed out that Edward lived somewhere in what is today northern Baltimore City.

In October of 1711, he and several other men were appointed to meet at the new court house at Joppa, and take the votes of all freeholders living in the county to determine at what place they desire their courthouse to be located (Md. Archives 29:51).

Along with Richard Colegate, William Talbot, and Thomas Hammond he was elected to represent Baltimore Co. at a session of the Assembly held beginning 28 Oct., 1712 (op. cit.; pp. 128, 136). There must have been some question as to the validity of their election, for on 31 Oct., 1712, all four were expelled from the House (op. cit., 137). Whatever the difficulty, the next year Stevenson and the others were elected again, and on 30 Oct., 1713, they were sworn in as members of the Assembly (op. cit., 27C).

INTRODUCTION

I have tried in this little booklet to trace as many of the descendants of Edward and Mary Stovenson as possible. I have followed the female lines down as far as has been practical, and have tried to document all material. There seems to be no accurate record of this family in print, so I hope this little pamphlet to fill this need.

I am indebted to many people for the use of their material, and especially to Mrs. F. C. Rogers, of Gulfport, Florida. Where the compilations of other people have been used, I have mentioned their names in the text, and I am very grateful for their help.

I am sure there are some errors in this book, and as they are brought to my attention, it is my hope to publish a supplement at some future date.

THE LETTERING SYSTEM

Each child takes his father's code letters, with an additional digit showing his own place in the family. Thus when one finds his latest known ancestor, he can trace back to the emigrant simply by looking for the parent whose code is indicated.

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Edward acquired some considerable amounts of land in Baltimore Co. Some of the tracts he owned were: "Fellowship" surveyed in 1696 for John Oldton; "Enlargement" 144 acres, surveyed for Edward in 1704; "Addition to Fellowship" 202 acres surveyed for him in 1703; "Edward and Will's Valleys and Hills" 786 acres also surveyed for him in 1703; "Haile's Adventure" surveyed for Nicholas Haile in 1689; and "Addition to Westwood" 100 acres surveyed in 1694 for Joseph Strawbridge. (These tracts were named as Stevenson tracts in the Baltimore Co. Rent Rolls, published in the Md. His. Mag.)

An article from the Towson Jeffersonian, in the vertical file at the Md. Hist. Society, on the tract Fellowship describes how the land was passed down, and also gives a description of the house. This property is located where the Rodgers Forge Golf Club is today. In 1702, Edward Stevenson bought 160 acres "Fellowship" from John Oldton. The following year he had surveyed "Addition to Fellowship", 202 acres of adjacent vacant land. The house was made up of two two-story wings connected by a one-story section. The north, or kitchen, wing was made of stone, while the other wing was frame. This latter wing contained the front door, which looked south, but was later shifted to the west end of the building. In later years, as this tract was broken up, parts were sold to the Black and Decker Company, and to Thomas Willen, who owned the estate "Aigburth Vale"

Edward made his will 25 Jan., 1715/16, leaving to his dear children all his land equally among them, male and female. His loving wife Mary was to be his sole and only executrix. The will was probated 17 April, 1716 (Md. Cal. Wills 4:79).

On 14 Jan., 1718 (new style), the inventory of his estate was filed. It covered 7 pages, and totaled £ 493-18-7 $\frac{1}{4}$. Christopher Randall and Peter Bond were the appraisers, but Bond died before the clerk could prepare the forms. John Merryman made his mark (M) as the nearest relation. (Testamentary Proceedings, Box 4, folder 26; Hall of Records: Annapolis).

On 22 Sept., 1719, Henry Sater and Mary, his wife, the executrix of Edward Stevenson, filed an account of Stevenson's estate, covering some three pages; one-third of the estate was left to the widow, and the other two-thirds were left to be divided among the deceased's children: Edward, Mary, Richard, Henry, and John Stevenson, one of the children "having married, left one child, and died" (this was daughter Elizabeth, who m. William Barney, and had two children, and died - RJB note) (Test. Proc. Box 3, folder 77, Hall of Records).

Henry and Mary Sater filed accounts of their settlement of the estate in 1724, and again in 1727. There seems to have been a dispute between the Saters and Mary (daughter of the dec. Edward) Stevenson, now wife of George Brown, over the settling of the estate.

The maiden name of Edward's wife Mary is not known, but several pieces of evidence provide good leads. 1) She may have been a Merryman since John Merryman made his mark on the inventory as nearest relation. 2) She may have been related to John Vickery, who in his will made 5 Nov., 1711, left "Jack's Double Purchase" to his son Richard Stevenson Vickery, and if he died without

heirs, the tract was to pass to Richard King Stevenson, son of Edward and Mary Stevenson (Md. Cal. Wills 3:216). 3) She may have been born a King, since one of her sons was named Richard King Stevenson. 4) Mrs. William G. Buckey suggests she was a sister of Charles Smith of Charles Co., whose will in 1705 named a sister Mary Stevenson.

A. EDWARD STEVENSON, of Edward and Mary, was b. _____, and d. 1760, in Baltimore Co., Md. He m. Susan (possibly Tracey) prior to 1724.

On 4 Sept., 1734, he and William Rogers conveyed to John Ozbin (Osborne) and John Bond parts of "Friendship" (Balto. Co. Deeds Liber HWS # M, f. 120,121).

The following year, on 2 March, 1735, he conveyed to his brothers and sisters various tracts as their share of their father's estate. To his brother Henry went 202 acres of "Addition to Fellowship"; to brother Richard King Stevenson - 290 acres, part of "Edward and Will's Valleys and Hills"; and to brother John, 290 acres of the same tract (Balto. Co. Deeds, op. cit., ff. 384, 386, 388).

30 Aug., 1746, he and his wife Susanna, and John Osborne conveyed 50 acres of "Friendship" to James Kelley (Balto. Co. Deeds, TB # E, f. 208).

Other tracts of land he owned included: "Canaan" 100 acres patented by him in 1729; "Stevenson's Plains" 100 acres he patented in 1729; "Copper Ridge" which he patented in 1743 jointly, with Dutton Lane; Thomas Taylor, and Thomas Sheredine; and "Canaan" (again), 150 acres patented by him also in 1743 (Notes from card index to Land Patents at State Land Office; Annapolis).

He may have been a member of the Church of England as the births of some of his children were recorded in St. Paul's Parish Register, Baltimore Co.

His will was made 9 June, 1760, and filed 30 June, of the same year (Balto. Co. Wills 2:64). To his sons Henry and Joshua, he left "Fellowship"; to son John, land near Gunpowder Falls called "Climmalira"; to daughter Mary personal property. 372 acres of his land were to be sold ("Canaan" and "Buck Range"), and the money was to be applied to the estate. He names his wife, and the children: Edward, Henry, John, Joshua, and Mary.

The following part of his will definitely establishes his place in the Stevenson family: "My father, Edward Stevenson, left by will dated 25 Jan., 1715/16, well known to me, did devise his land equally to all his children, male and female, but by reason of one witness being dead, and not appearing in the probate of said will, I made deeds to my brothers, and on behalf of my sisters, truly intending to settle the devises of my father, as by said will was intended, and in which deviation (?) mistakes, errors, and omissions have happened, I do hereby will, devise, and direct that they may be truly and justly rectified... (He goes on to name specifically his brothers Richard King Stevenson, and John Stevenson, and his sister Mary, wife of George Brown.).

Edward and Susan (Tracey?) Stevenson had issue:

AA. EDWARD STEVENSON, of Edward and Susan, was b. 6 Nov., 1724-1725, and d. ca. 1794 in Frederick Co., Md. He m. Rachel (____), probably the widow of _____ Riston, as Edward's will names his wife's son Samuel Riston.

He moved from Baltimore Co. to Frederick Co. around 1752, for on 29 Nov. of that year, William Kerly, shipwright, sold to Edward Stevenson, Jr., of Baltimore Co. part of two tracts of land in Frederick Co.: "Leonard's Range" 100 acres; and "Cornwell Resurveyed" 213 acres (Frederick Co. Deeds, Liber E, f. 27).

In 1766, Edward and his wife Rachel sold to Casper Devilbiss 650 acres of Leonard's Range, on the south side of Sam's Creek (Fred. Co. Deeds, Liber K, f. 902).

His will, made 30 March, 1782, was filed for probate 24 June, 1794 (Fred. Co. Wills GM # 2, f. 537). In it he names his children Sarah, Joshua, Susanna, Mary, Edward, and John, and his wife's son Samuel Riston. The entire estate was to be divided between his children, but Sarah was to have, in addition to her share, a horse or mare out of the breed her uncle Joshua Stevenson gave her. His brothers John and Joshua were to be the executors. William Roberts, Sr., Edward Hodgkiss, John England, and Daniel Stephenson were witnesses.

St. Thomas (Balto. Co.) Parish Register records the death of Edward Stevenson on 21 June, 1794.

AAA. EDWARD STEVENSON, of Edward and Rachel, was b. ca. 1772, and d. _____. 23 Nov., 1804 (FCML), he married Frances Pole, who d. 10 Feb., 1862, at her residence near Towson, aged 85 years (Towson Advocate, 18 Feb., 1862).

24 March, 1810, Edward Stevenson and his wife Frances conveyed 73 and 1/8 acres of "Stevenson's Garden" to Francis Hollingsworth. The land excluded the graveyard containing 16 square perches, and it was stipulated in the deed that no one was to be buried there but the children of Edward Stevenson, then deceased, their wives and children and husbands, and their descendants by marriage and consanguinity, except Edward Stevenson should wish to bury

therein a particular friend or acquaintance, and the liberty is reserved of visiting and repairing the said graveyard when necessary (Fred. Co. Deeds Liber WR # 37, f. 100).

The obituary of Edward's daughter Sarah in the Towson Baltimore County Union of 16 March, 1907, tells how in 1840 her father moved from Carroll Co. to Baltimore Co., when he inherited the tract "Fellowship" from (his sister) Mary Chamberlain.

He and his family are listed in the 1850 Census of Baltimore Co., Dist. 2 -#126-133 as follows: Edward, age 78; Frances, age 77; Ellen, aged 44; John, aged 40; Frances, aged 37; Sarah, 35; and Susanna, 33. Residing with the family was Shadraak Flowman, 80.

Edward Stevenson, aged 84, died at his residence near Towson on 15 July, 1852, after 3 days' illness (his obituary in the Baltimore County Advocate, 24 July, 1852). The obituary places his birth date as 1768, while the census makes it 1772.

Edward and Frances (Pole) Stevenson had issue:

AAC. MARY STEVENSON, of Edward and Rachel, was b. ca. 1770, and d. 10 Nov., 1840, in her 70th year (Baltimore Sun, 18 Nov., 1840). She m. Hoopes Chamberlain, son of John.

Her two daughters are mentioned in Mary (AE) Stevenson's will (see below). Joshua (AFD) Stevenson left his two cousins, Matilda and Emma Chamberlain, certain property. The article from the Jeffersonian, on the tract "Fellowship" cited above, says this property was part of the tract "Fellowship". Emma died, leaving her share to her sister Matilda, who d. 1834, leaving her property to her mother Mary.

Mary Chamberlain's will, made 27 July, 1839, and filed 17 Dec., 1840 (Baltimore Co. Wills 12:148) bequeaths "Fellowship" to her brother Edward and his wife Frances. His children are named: Ellen; Francis; John, Frances, Sarah, and Susanna Stevenson. Edward and his son Francis were to be co executors.

Hoopes and Mary (Stevenson) Chamberlain had at least two children, both of whom died without issues:

AACB. Emma Chamberlain, d. before 1834

AE. MARY STEVENSON, of Edward and Susan, was b. 11 March, 1735; and d. 25 July, 1820, unmarried.

She is included in a separate section because her will shed so much light on family relationships. It was signed 5 June, 1809, and filed for probate 2 August, 1820 (Baltimore Co. Wills 11:162). In it she names her nephew Samuel Stevenson; her nieces Sally Stevenson, Susan Roberts, Polly (Mary) Chamberlain, and Urith Stevenson; Samuel Stevenson's three daughters, Hoop Chamberlain's two daughters; and her nephew Joshua (AFD) Stevenson of Henry.

AF. HENRY STEVENSON, of Edward and Susan, was b. 27 June, 1737, and d. 10 Nov., 1816. He m. Rachel, dau. of Samuel and Urath (Randall) Owings, b. 1736, d. 25 July, 1815.

He inherited the tract "Fellowship" from his father. The Jeffersonian article tells that he was at one time Sheriff and Tax Collector for Baltimore Co. In 1790, he is said to have mortgaged the property to Josias Pennington, William Askem, and Charles Jessop. Later he assigned portions of it to his brother Joshua (AH), who had already inherited parts of it; to his (Henry's) son Joshua (AFD); and to his son-in-law Josias (BG) Stevenson.

About 1777, Henry Stevenson of Edward submitted a bond for the faithful execution of the duties of sheriff of Baltimore Co. (Baltimore Co. Deeds Liber WG # B, f. 264).

That he was a son of Edward and Susan is proved in the bond he made to John Stevenson, Sr., of Baltimore Co., for 10,000 pounds specie: 25 July, 1785; Henry Stevenson of Edward is firmly bound to John Stevenson, Sr., ...whereas Edward Stevenson, did on 2 March, 1735, convey to the above named John Stevenson, Sr., part of "Edwards and Wills Valleys and Hills"; and since then the said John Stevenson Sr. has had some doubts about the validity of said deed... (Baltimore Co. Deeds Liber WG # X, f. 616).

28 May, 1800; Henry Stevenson of Baltimore Co., gentleman, sold to Joshua Stevenson, his son, for 5 shillings, 200 acres of "Stevenson's Garden" in Frederick Co. This is a part of the land conveyed by the trustees of Edward Stevenson, dec'd., to Joshua Stevenson, brother of the said Henry who (Joshua) has lately died intestate (Fred. Co. Deeds, Liber WR # 20, f. 341).

No record of a will or other settlement of the estate of Henry Stevenson has been found. His death date was taken from the Stevenson chart at the Frederick Co. Historical Society.

The children of Henry and Urath were:

AFA. EDWARD STEVENSON, of Henry and Rachel, was b. 30 Dec., 1763, and d. 4 Sept., 1807. He is included in the Stevenson chart at the Fred. Co. Historical Society. Edward Stevenson married Mary Chamberlain, 5 Oct., 1782 (FCML).

Edward Stevenson made his will 27 Aug., 1807, and it was filed 26 Sept., 1807 (Baltimore County Wills 8:240). In it he names his wife Mary, his son Isaiah, his brother Samuel, and Samuel's two sons: Henry and Evan.

Edward and Mary (Chamberlain?) Stevenson were the parents of:

AFB. SAMUEL STEVENSON, of Henry and Rachel, was b. 29 May, 1765, and d. 30 Oct., 1821. He m. 18 Nov., 1788, Lucy, daughter of Basil and Hannah (Crockett) Dorsey; b. ----, and d. 11 Sept., 1822, in her 53rd year. Both were buried on the Riegel Farm.

AFBA. BASIL DORSEY STEVENSON, of Samuel and Lucy, was b. 16 Aug., 1789, and d. 8 Aug., 1857. He m. 13 May, 1813, Henrietta, dau. of Joseph and Elizabeth (Lawrence) Wells.

On 20 Dec., 1834, he advertised in the Westminster Carrolltonian he would sell his farm, located 2 miles southwest of Westminster, as he was intending to move west.

Mr. William Stevenson, of Orion, Ill., writing in 1944 to Mr. Goldsborough of the Frederick County Historical Society, stated that Basil was quite a traveller, making several trips back and forth to Quincy, Illinois. Twice he made the trip on horseback, and once brought back a grandfather's clock that is still in the family.

The will of Basil Dorsey Stevenson is filed at Adams Co. Illinois.

He and his wife had issue:

No record of any issue.

AH. JOSHUA STEVENSON, of Edward and Susan, was b. 13 Nov., 1742, and d. 20 May, 1799. He m. Elizabeth -----.

An account of his estate was filed 21 June, 1800, in Baltimore Co (Baltimore Co. Administration Accounts 13:282). The heirs named were his (Brother?) Henry Stevenson; (his sister?) Mary Stevenson; widow Elizabeth Stevenson, and Thomas Roberts (who may have been the Thomas Roberts who m. Susanna, dau. of Joshua's deceased brother Edward).

No record of any issue.

B. HENRY STEVENSON, of Edward and Mary, was b. ----, and d. ----; He m. 19 June, 1735, Jemima, daughter of Charles and Jane (Long) Merryman. The Maryland Historical Magazine of 1915 (Vol. 10) contains the Merryman pedigree.

2 March, 1735, Edward Stevenson, of Edward, deeded his brother Henry Stevenson 202 acres of "Addition to Fellowship" (Balto. Co. Deeds, HWS # M, f. 384). The Baltimore County Debt Book of 1750 shows him as the owner of this tract and 100 acres "The Dairy"

31 August, 1762, Henry Stevenson of Baltimore County, planter, sold George Hartway, for 10 pounds, 60 acres in Frederick County, being part of 320 acres of vacant land added for said Henry Stevenson in a resurvey made for him 3 July, 1759, on a tract called "The Dairy," adjoining Kelly's Delight! Henry's wife Jemima consented to the sale. (Fred. Co. Deeds, Liber H., f. 139).

Henry Stevenson conveyed parts of his land holdings in Frederick Co. to his sons Henry, Jr., Charles, and Henry Jr (again, in 1769, 1770, and 1775 (Frederick Co. Deeds Liber M, f. 370; N, f. 520; and BD # 2, f. 66). As no wife signs the deeds, it is possible that Jemima (Merryman) Stevenson died before 1769.

No will or other record of death has been found for Henry Stevenson, so his date of death is not known.

The list of his children has been compiled from several sources: St. Paul's Parish Registers; Frederick Co. Deeds, and the will of Henry's daughter, Jemima Stevenson, cited below. Henry and Jemima had issue:

BC. HENRY STEVENSON, of Henry and Jemima, was b. 2 March, 1739, in Baltimore Co. (See St Pauls Par.Reg.), and d. 1813, in Frederick Co., Md. He m. Jane daughter of John and Anne (Ensor) Stansbury, b. 26 June, 1736, d. ----.

He acquired from his father in 1769 and 1775 parcels of "The Dairy" and "Resurvey on the Dairy," totaling 121 acres (Frederick Co. Deeds, Liber

M, f. 370, and Liber BD # 2, f. 66).

The Frederick County Committee of Observation resolved on 4 June, 1776, that his company and 6 other companies be formed into a battalion. In his company were Lieutenant Charles Stevenson, and ensign William Stevenson (possibly his brothers) (Md. His. Mag., 11:313, 308).

23 Nov., 1778, he conveyed to his Josiah Stevenson, tanner, 4 lots in the town of New Windsor (Fred. Co. Deeds WR # 17, f. 458).

His children must have been entitled to a share of the estate of James Stansbury (their mother had a brother James), which James had inherited from Walter Dickson, for on 15 May, 1802, Henry Stevenson, Joshua Stevenson, Josiah Stevenson and wife Margaret, Henry Brown and wife Anne, Ludwick Weaver and wife Ruth, James Brown and wife Mary, and Elizabeth Stevenson deeded to Isaac Stansbury their share to Walter Dickson's estate which James Stansbury died seised of. Earlier, in 1800, Thomas and Sarah Marshall of "the territory northwest of the Ohio River" conveyed their share of this estate to Henry Stevenson (Balto. Co. Deeds WG # 65, f. 529).

Henry Stevenson made his will 30 July, 1813, and it was filed for probate 25 Sept., 1813 (Fred. Co. Wills RB # 1, f. 421). He mentions a son Joshua, an unm. daughter Elizabeth; daughters Nancy Brown, Ruth Weaver, and Mary Brown, and his son-in-law Lewis Weaver. The inventory of his estate was filed 13 Oct., 1813, by Joshua Stevenson and Lewis Weaver, the executors, and totaled \$2,219.11, and L 52-13-6 in sperate debts (Fred. Co. Invenotires, Liber RB # 3, f. 491).

18 April, 1811, Philip Barton Key, of Montgomery Co., sold to Josiah Stevenson, 102 acres of "Terra Rubra" (Fred. Co. Deeds Liber WR # 39, f. 315). This estate, was owned by the family of Francis Scott Key, who wrote the words to the National Anthem.

A chart made by William Crabbs (now deceased) of Hagerstown, and sent to Mrs. William G. Buckey (now deceased) of Baltimore; who sent it along to Mrs. Mary E. Rogers of Gulfport, Florida; shows that Josiah and Margaret had the following children (order of birth uncertain):

In 1939, William J. Crabs of Hagerstown, now deceased, wrote to Mrs. Wm. G. Buckey, that in 1915, Mrs. H. T. weaver of Gettysburg wrote him that her mother was Lydia Brown, and her father was Nimrod Stevenson. Her father had one brother (William) who went west... My grandmother, Elizabeth Stansbury, married as her 2nd husband, Samuel Devillbiss. She had a niece Fanny or Frances Stansbury. Mrs. Rogers says Elizabeth was a daughter of William Stansbury.

Joshua's will was made 4 April, 1816, and filed 10 June, 1816 (Fred. Co. Wills Liber HS # 1, f. 256). He made William Durbin, Jr., sole executor, and then names his (Joshua's) wife Elizabeth, and his sons:

The Frederick County Committee of Observation resolved that Charles Stevenson... (and others)... be appointed to assist James Winchester and David Schriver in handing about the Association Paper (Md. His. Mag., 11:245). Charles Stevenson was appointed a lieutenant in Capt. Henry Stevenson's Co. (Md. His. Mag. 11:308).

Notes compiled by Mrs. J. R. Ford give Charles Stevenson's wife as Ruth Stansbury. William J. Crabbs, of Hagerstown, a descendant of Charles' dau. Elizabeth, who m. Charles Devilbiss, says that he was told that Charles' wife was a member of the Stansbury family. Nevertheless, deeds recorded in the Frederick County Court House show that between 1795 and 1806, Charles' wife was Anne -----.

Her maiden name may have been Price. John Price, Sr., in his will made 31 Dec., 1784, and filed 8 May, 1790 (Balto. Co. Wills 4:422) names his wife Rebecca, and his children: Benjamin, Mordecai, Isabella, and Elizabeth Price, and dau. Anne Stevenson. Benjamin Price (son of the above John?) in his will (See Balto. Co. Wills 9:444) mentions his sisters Elizabeth and Isabell Price, and his nephews Nicholas Stevenson and Benjamin Price of Mordecai.

Mr. Crabbs goes on to say that Charles first worked for Jesse Cloud at Union Bridge, Md., and later he conducted the White Hall Tavern for William Stansbury. Still later he owned a farm, located on the Littlestown Pike, between Westminster and Mayberry. He finally retired and lived in Uniontown, Carroll Co., where he is buried.

Joseph Hall of Mount Pleasant, \emptyset Iowa, related how Stephen, a saddlemaker of Fredericksburg (?), Md., married Ruth, who was disinherited by her father, when the couple eloped.

Stephen went to Washington Co., Penna., and thence to Steubenville Land District, Ohio. He crossed the Allegheny Mountains on horseback, and later, when Mrs. Ford returned home to visit relatives, she is said to have swum the Ohio River on horseback (told by Henry K. Ford, a grandson). There is a family tradition that her father left her 5 slaves, but she refused them.

If his son dies without heirs, however, the estate is to pass to Richard King Stevenson, son of Edward and Mary Stevenson. (See Md. Cal. of Wills __:__).

2 March, 1735, Richard King Stevenson was conveyed by his brother Edward 290 acres, part of "Edward and Wills Valley and Hills" (Balto. Co. Deeds Liber HWS # M, f.386).

30 Oct., 1737, for 27 pounds, Richard and his wife Rachel conveyed to George Buchanan 120 acres of "Selset", also known as "Jack's Double Purchase", which descended to Richard by the death of Richard Stevenson Vickory, in pursuance of the will of Vickory's father (Balto. Co. Deeds HWS # 1A, f. 32).

Three years later, for the love he bears his cousins John and Jonathan Plowman, Richard King Stevenson deeded them 50 more acres of "Jack's Double Purchase" (op. cit., f. 438).

CED. ALEXANDER STEVENSON, of Sater and Anne, was b. 1788; d. 7 June, 1824, in his 35th year (Balto. Patriot and Mercantile Advertiser, 8 June, 1824). He m. in 1818, Anne, dau. of Lieutenant Griffith and Mary (Burgess) Evans. (Anne's father had fought in the Revolutionary War).

The Towson Advocate of 25 May, 1861, contains the obituary of Elizabeth, widow of Nathan Stevenson, who d. 13 May, 1861, in her 77th year.

From his father, Nathan inherited part of the home plantation, "Edwards and Wills Valleys and Hills"

His will was made 30 January, 1841, and filed 17 June, 1841 (Balto. Co. Wills 20:97). In it he names his wife Elizabeth, who was to have his land in Franklin Co., Ohio, where his sons Joshua L. and Nathan A. "are now residing". His son William W. was to have a tract of land in Baltimore County, after the death of his wife (the testator's wife), and was to pay \$100.00 to six of the children.

CF. DANIEL STEVENSON, of Richard King and Rachel, was b. 2 Sept., 1737; d. 3 Sept., 1827. According to data supplied by Mrs. F. C. Rogers, Daniel of Richard King is the same Daniel who fought in the Revolution, and later went to Fairfield Co., Ohio, where his grave is marked by the N.S.D.A.R.

The Revolutionary Daniel married a cousin Ruth Stevenson, b. 2 Jan., 1743; d. 12 June, 1831. Despite the apparent discrepancy in dates it is the compiler's opinion that she is the Ruth Stevenson, daughter of Henry and Jemima (Merryman) Stevenson, b. 21 Jan., 1748, according to St. Pauls Parish Register. A crumbling tombstone could have obliterated part of the figures on her stone. Richard King Stevenson is the only one of the four brothers who had a son Daniel who fits the requirements.

Volume 2 of the Official Roster of Soldiers of the American Revolution who Lived in the State of Ohio, p. 330, says that Daniel came from Frederick Co., Md., where he enlisted in the Revolution, and was with Washington at Valley Forge. He was a wagoner and furnished his own teams.

He was a member of the Methodist Church. On 15 March, 1787, he was one of the grantees in a deed of trust made by Andrew Foulson for $\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land: "York Company's Defence" on which had lately been erected a meeting house. Foulson stipulated in the deed that only those appointed by the Annual Conference of Methodists in America were to be allowed to preach, and they might preach on no other doctrine than that contained in Mr. Wesley's notes on the New Testament, and his four published volumes of sermons (Fred. Co. Deeds, Liber WR # 7, f. 174).

In 1805, he and his family came to Richland twp., Fairfield Co., Ohio. Here he entertained Bishop Asbury in his home, and gave the land for the first Methodist Church in the county (See Wiseman, Pioneer Period and Pioneer People of Fairfield County).

Daniel died in Richland twp., and is buried in the Stevenson graveyard, near Rushville. His grave was marked by the Elizabeth Sherman Keese chapter, N.S.D.A.R.

Mrs. Fred Faust, of West Helena, Arkansas, has sent the letters written between Maryland and Ohio by members of the Stevenson and Peters families, which appear in the appendix of this book.

Samuel and Mary Peters came to Ohio in 1812, and lived for five years on what is now the Frank Stevenson farm. They had 13 children, whose descendants have formed the Peters Family Association. According to Wiseman's book (see above) many of these descendants have been prosperous citizens.

They liked the soil, but decided to go ~~farther~~ farther west (Would this be with brother Wesley, to California?) However, the soil was too sandy, so they returned to Kalida, and bought a farm, and some property in town. William ran a saw-mill. (Data from Mrs. Cameron)

D. JOHN STEVENSON, of Edward and Mary, was b. -----, and d. 1786; He was twice married; the first time to Mary Tipton, b. 18 Feb., 1717, dau. of Thomas and Sarah (Steptoe?) Tipton, and secondly, to Susanna -----, who evidently survived him.

On 2 March, 1735, he was conveyed by his brother Edward, 290 acres of "Edwards and Wills Valleys and Hills" (Balto. Co. Deeds, Liber EWS # M, f. 383). This conveyence was confirmed in 1785, by Edward's son, Henry (See Balto. Co. Deeds, Liber WG # X, f. 616; cited above on p. 7).

On 22 June, 1747, Jonathan and Juliaha Tipton conveyed him 100 acres, part of "Molly and Sally's Delight" (Balto. Co. Deeds Liber TB # E, f. 461). The Baltimore County Debt Book for 1750 shows him as the owner of both of these tracts (folio 29).

7 March, 1760, James Chilcoat conveyed to him 50 acres of "MacClane's Friendship" (Balto. Co. Deeds, Liber B # H, f. 125).

John Stevenson's will was made 26 October, 1785, and filed 22 June, 1786 (Balto. Co. Wills, Liber 4, f. 147). To his sons John, William, Edward and Joshua, he left parts of "Edwards and Wills Valleys and Hills". He also named his daughters Eliza(beth?) Todd, Mary Stevenson, and Sarah Stevenson. His wife Susanna and son John were made co-executors.

Administration was granted to the executors 19 July, 1786, and accounts were filed on 16 April, 1788, and 9 Feb., 1791. The inventory of the estate totaled L 274:9:0 (Baltimore County Administrations # 1, 1776-1790).

John Stevenson fought in the Revolution, and later moved to Madison twp., Franklin Co., Ohio (Roster of Revolutionary Soldiers Buried in Ohio).

On 3 June, 1806, John Stevenson, and his wife Mary, of the state of Ohio, for ~~\$43~~ \$4563.00, deeded to George and John Kelso 174½ acres, part of which was willed to the grantor by John Stevenson, and part conveyed to the grantor by Charles Carroll, George Stevenson, and Mordecai Stevenson (Balto. Co. Deeds, Liber WG # 91, f. 360).
