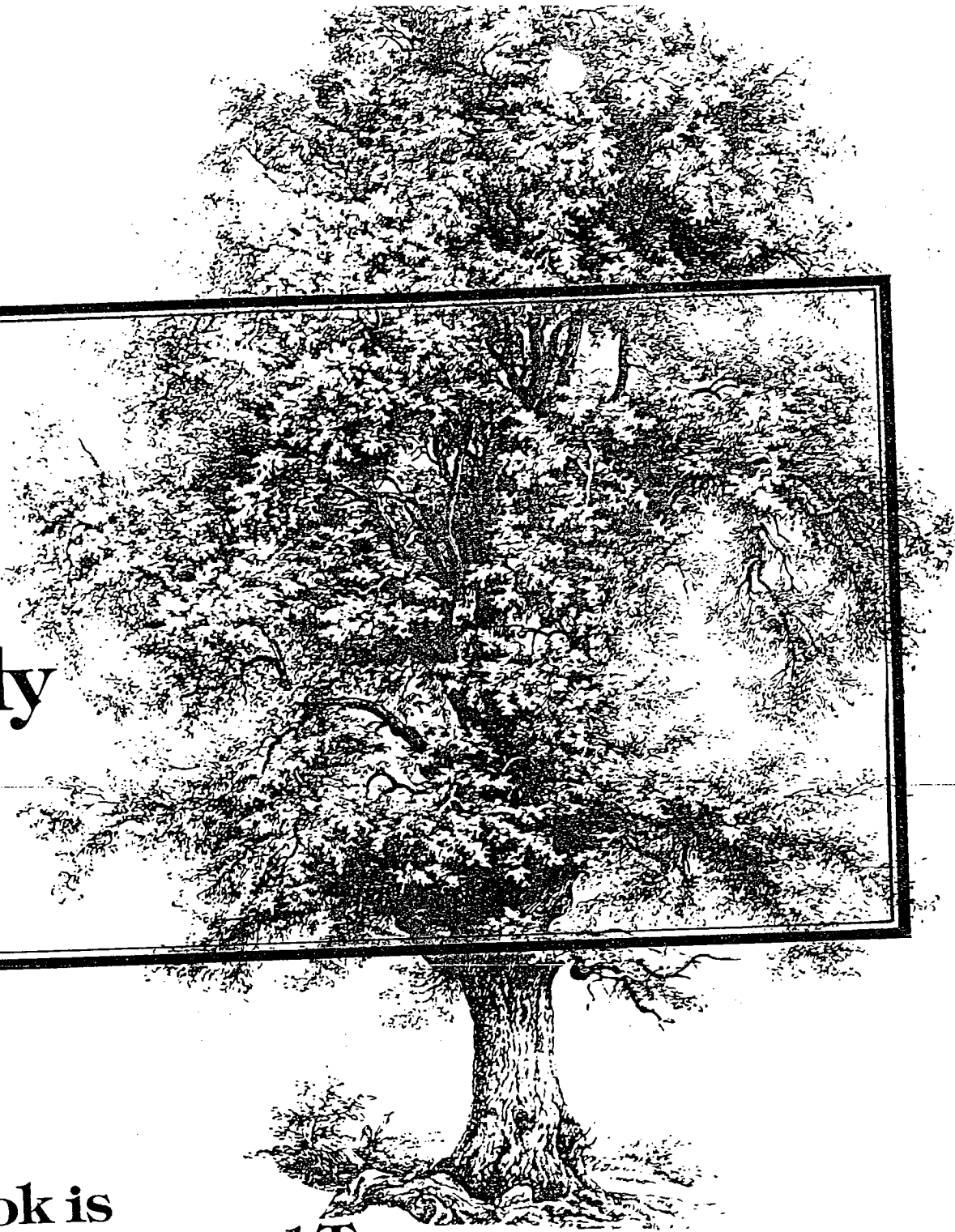

THE ROAD TO WHYNOT

This limited collection of records and papers on the BOOKER family of Whynot, Lauderdale County, Mississippi, and their related families, is divided into many individual books starting with the present day Bookers of Lauderdale County, Mississippi and going back to the Bookers of Conecuh-Monroe Counties, Alabama, and back to the Bookers of North Carolina. It also includes many related families including the BROWNS, the ALLENS, the BASKINS, the HORTONS, the RAINERS, the RAWSONS and the WHITES. Some limited information is given on the MCCLAMMYS, the MELTONS, THE HOLBERGS, the HERMANS, the ALLENS, the COVINGTONS, the HAUGHTONS, the GREENS, and the GUNNS.

DANIEL EZEKIEL GREENE was born most likely in the Greenville District of South Carolina according to the book "Pioneers of Sumter County, Alabama", Vol. I, and he moved from there to Green's Landing in Sumter County, Alabama and on to McCainville. His grave marker gives his date of death as August 21, 1842, at age 49 years, 7 months, and 20 days, and from that we assume he was born on January 1, 1793.

He owned land in Section 35, Section 36, and Section 31 in Sumter County, Alabama. Greens Landing was named for him and is located in Section 29 of Township 19N in Sumter County. McCainville was located in Section 6, Township 19N, Range 2W, Sumter County, AL.

"History of Livingston, Alabama" by R.D. Spratt in 1928, says "Between the Tankersly and the Parker plantations was a farm belonging to Daniel Greene, a prominent man of early times." And, "He had relations named Greene and Gunn and Andrews. He is buried at the Parker place."

Captain Parker was the leading citizen, or one of the leading citizens, of that time. The Parker Cemetery is located 1/4 mile South of the Livingston to Emelle Road at the Frank Campbell place (as of this early writing). Daniel Greene is buried there along with:

Hollan Ann Greene, 6 Mo. dau. of William H. Greene, who died Feb. 26, 1844.

Bell Floyd Greene, dau. of McDuffie and Mattie Greene, who died as an infant.

Pamelia Ann Greene, 16 year old dau. of Daniel and Stacy Greene, died April 11, 1846.

Most of the other graves are Parkers and a few Browns.

In Will Book 1, Page 166 of the records of Sumter County, Alabama, is recorded the will of Daniel Greene which was dated September 26, 1842. The main items in the will were:

1st item we gave to his wife Stacy Green ten negroes to be selected by herself out of the whole number of negroes owned by him at his death.....also her choice of one of two tracts of land, the one on which he lived at the time of his death and the one lying adjoining and below the town of Livingston to have and to hold during her widowhood or natural life. The balance of his property after the selection, has been made he gave to his children, choice and share alike.....he appointed Exekiel Andrews his executor and the witnesses were G.G. Tankersly, James Parker and William Lockard." The above is worded as close to the way Daniel worked the will as possible.

Daniel Greene married Stacy Andrews and their children were:

- (1) Elizabeth who married James McCown (who like Daniel Greene, ^{& wife} a lot of land in Sumter County, AL).
- (2) Nancy who married James McMillan.
- (3) Francis Norris Greene, who married Parson Robert B. Gunn, a Primitive Baptist Church Minister.
- (4) Stacy Floyd Greene, who married Radford M. Gunn, the brother of the above Parson Gunn.
- (5) Charlotte Greene, who married Jerome McCown (not sure of the connection to above James McCown).
- (6) Louisa, who married David Wallace Field.....she re-married after his death to Joseph Cason.
- (7) Burrell H. Greene, who died at age 17 in Wakelock, MS.
- (8) McDuffie Greene, who married Martha Ann Eanbee on Oct. 4, 1853.

- (9) Martha Greene, who married John L. Cary Jan. 26, 1848.
- (10) Melvira Greene, who married James L. Lewis Mar. 30, 1853.
- (11) Susan Greene
- (12) James M. Greene, who was a doctor, and returned the body of Silas Gunn (his nephew) home during the Civil War. He married Ophelia Walton.
- (13) Ezekiel Greene, Jr. (I assume Daniel Ezekiel Greene, Jr.) who married Elizabeth V. (Betty) Jenkins.

After Daniel died in 1842, Stacy Andrews Greene, moved to near Egypt, Mississippi on the Chickasaw/Monroe County line. She is buried in the Gunntown Cemetery on the James A. King II place which was the old Parson Gunn and Radfird Gunn farm during their lifetime. The cemetery is located near where the Old Gunntown School and Gunntown Church were located in the 1800's. Today it is located in the middle of a cow pasture and very hard to get to. Although enclosed with a good iron fence, it is over run with weeds and underbrush.

Francis Norris Greene, dau. of Daniel and Stacy Andrews Greene, married Robert Bolling Gunn (sometimes spelled as Boling and sometimes as Bowling). He was called "Parson" as he was a Baptist minister and the minister of the Gunntown Church and the Hatley, MS Church. And I think at Aberdeen. He was born July 12, 1805 in Brunswick County, Virginia, and was the son of Radford Madison Gunn and Sylvia Reid. He married Francis Norris Greene in 1835 in Sumter County, AL. Francis was born in 1818 in Sumter Co., AL and died in 1906 in Chickasaw County, MS and is buried in the Gunn Cemetery at Gunntown near Egypt, MS.

Not only was Parson Gunn a preacher of the Word but he worked as a farmer and he and his brother Radfird Madison Gunn, ran a merchandise general store known as R.B. & R.M. Gunn's Store. They bought the business from Eging Bros. and in their later years they sold it to Barker, Parish & Co.

We know the Gunns and the Greens came to Chickasaw Co., MS some time after 1842 and before 1850 (after the death of Daniel Ezekiel Greene and before the 1850 census). Parson was listed as the preacher of the Hatley Primitive Church (called New Hope Church) in 1848. So it looks like they all came between 1842 and 1848 or there about. Parson was a leading citizen of Egypt and Gunntown and so was his brother Radfird Madison Gunn.

Parson and Francis Norris Greene had the following children:

- (1) Ann Louisa Gunn, who married Patrick Henry Haughton in 1858 in Chickasaw County, MS. Ann Louisa was born Aug. 10, 1836 in Monroe Co., MS and died Jan. 16, 1873 in Chickasaw Co., MS (Note that the Gunn farms were located on the Chickasaw/Monroe County lines and some records were recorded in one county and some in another.
- (2) William Reid Gunn, born Jan. 10, 1846, died Nov. 5, 1864, who married first to Victoria Gillespie and then to Mary Mollie Peel.
- (3) Robert B. Gunn, born April 6, 1858, and died on May 16, 1851, at age 3 years.
- (4) Fannie G., born 1853, and died 1932, married Adam Carlisle on Sep. 23, 1873 in Chickasaw Co., MS.
- (5) India E. Gunn, born Jan. 10, 1846, died Nov. 5, 1864, did not marry, died at age 18.
- (6) Ida Roberta, born Nov. 10, 1856, died Jan. 28, 1897, married Amos H. Richardson.
- (7) Fannie Ida, born Jan. 10, 1850, died at age 1 year.
- (8) Clara C., born Oct. 25, 1851, died July 11, 1859, died at age 8 years.
- (9) Unnamed child who died 1st day.

They lost one child at birth, one at age one, one at age three, and one at age eight. One died at 18, only four lived long enough to reach adulthood and marry out of the nine.

Parson owned a lot in Aberdeen in Block 109 (cost \$1200.00). They lived there for a short time.

In 1852, Parson Gunn, Richard Haughton, Abner Prewitt, Radford Madison Gunn, and Mark Prewitt, all of Monroe Co., Ms, were trustees of the Primitive Baptist Church of Aberdeen and bought Lot 9 in Block 85 for \$125.00. The church built there is now the Catholic Church of Aberdeen.

Allen Carr sold to Parson Gunn in 1852, the South $\frac{1}{2}$ of Section 14, T 14, R 5E, and the S $\frac{1}{2}$ of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 13, T 14, R 5, in the County of Chickasaw and the S $\frac{1}{2}$ of SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 18, T 14, R 6 E, and the N $\frac{1}{2}$ of Section 19, plus 107.97 acres off the N of the S $\frac{1}{2}$ of Sec. 19, T 14, R 6 E, in Monroe Co., MS, in all about 1,084 acres.

A.N. Barton sold to Parson Gunn the N ½ of Section 25, T 15, R 6 (346 acres) for \$3,000.00 on Nov. 20, 1847.

Parson Gunn sold to C.C. & J. Eging the N ½ of Sec. 25, T 15, R 6 E, (346 acres) for \$7,000.00. Looks like a fair return on his investment of \$3,000.00.

C.C. & J. Ewing sold to Parson Gunn in 1849, for \$500.00 lot 113 in Aberdeen.

Richard Harrison sold to Parson Gunn Block 109 in 1850.

ANN LOUISA GUNN, who married PATRICK HENRY HAUGHTON in 1858, in Chickasaw Co., MS, had a child named Fannie. She was born on June 18, 1866, in Chickasaw Co., MS and is buried at Magnolia Cemtery in Meridian (died April 9, 1952). Fannie married JOHN ALLEN, born May 13, 1850 in Egypt, MS, Chickasaw Co., MS. He died March 24, 1926, and is buried at Magnolia in Meridian also. Very little is know of John Allen or Fannie Haughton Allen.

Children of FANNIE HAUGHTON and JOHN ALLEN were:

- (1) JAMES PATRICK ALLEN, who was born in the James A. King II house in Egypt, MS. This old house was once a hotel and is near the railway tracks in downtown Egypt. Before the Civil War is was a hotel and during the wa;a big battle was fought there and many soldiers, Union and Confederate, are buried nearby. "Pat" married BERTHA PEARL GEEGGE, born Sep. 22, 1887, in Chunchula, AL, and died May 6th, 1978, in Brandon, MS, while staying in a Nursing Home near her grand-daughter, Anne Holberg Booker. They were married April 4, 1911 in Meridian, MS, and lived in Meridian, Tutwiler, MS, Haleyville, AL, and Temple, GA. He was the first motorcycle policeman in Meridian and was a salesman at times. For years he worked for his brother Henry in a furniture factory.
- (2) JOHN CARLISLE ALLEN, was born Oct. 17, 1889, and died Jan. 23, 1971, and is buried at Magnolia in Meridian. He never married and worked all his life for his brother Henry in the furniture factory.
- (3) HENRY ALLEN, married Virginia_____.
- (4) LOUISE ALLEN, called "T", was born Oct. 23, 1891, and died Jan. 8, 1981. She was born in Meridian, and married John Hubert (Jack) Semmes, born Jan. 1, 1881, and died July 5, 1932, both buried at Magnolia in Meridian.
- (5) CATHERINE ALLEN, called "Baby" was born in Meridian, MS and died and is buried in Florida. She married a man named Gore and her son is Dr. Tom Gore...of Florida.

E. quarter, South half of southwest quarter of Section 13, T. 14, R. 5, lying in Chickasaw County, also the South half of the southwest quarter of Section 18, T. 14, R. 6E, also the north half of Section 19, and one hundred and seven and 97/100 acres off the north boundary of the south half of the same Section 19, in T. 14., R. 6 East lying in Monroe County. The above described lands amounts to 1,084 acres.

3. Allen Carr (Seal)

In his writings of "who is who" in the early history of Monroe County, Miss. the late Dr. W. A. Evans wrote: "Aberdeen had four leading citizens who were called parsons. They were: Parson Gunn, Parson Mann, Parson Gladney and Parson Simon Sykes, and these parsons were shrewd business men, in addition to being preachers and owned large plantations:

The Reverend R. B. Gunn was affiliated with New Hope Primitive Baptist Church located at Hatley, Miss. and one of the oldest churches in Monroe County. His name appears in the Records in 1848 as one of the Officials of this church.

GUNN CLAN

The territory of the Clan Gunn was in Caithness and Sutherland and the clan claim to be descended from Olave the Black, Morse King of Man and the Isles, who died in 1237. The clan was noted for their war-like and ferocious character, and continued to extend their possessions until the fifteenth century, but their continual feuds with other clans led to their settling, at a later date, chiefly in Sutherland. A chief of the clan who flourished in the fifteenth century was George Gunn, who held the office of the Crowner, the badge of which was a great brooch. He lived in magnificent style in his castle at Clyth, but was killed by treachery in 1478, when endeavoring to arrange a reconciliation with the Clan Keith, between whom and the Gunns there had been a continued feud.

The Crowner was one of the greatest men in the country at that time, and his death was avenged about a century later by his grandson, who killed Keith of Ackergill with his son and twelve followers at Drummoy in Sutherland.

Feuds continued between the Gunns and the MacKays and the Earls of Caithness and Sutherland and in 1585 the Earls attacked the Gunns who, although lesser in number, held the advantage of a position on rising ground and the Gunns killed 140 of their enemies, and only darkness prevented a greater slaughter. The Gunns, however, were later defeated at Lockbroom by the Earl of Sutherland.

On the death of the 10th MacKeanish or Mac-Sheumais, the chiefship passed to the Gunns of Rhines.

ROBERT BOLLING GUNN, a descendant of the Gunns of Scotland, was born July 12, 1805 in Brunswick County, Virginia and was the son of Radford Madison Gunn and Sylvia Reid Gunn.

Robert Bolling Gunn married Miss Frances Norris Green in 1836, who was born October 4, 1810 in Sumpter County, Alabama.

Robert E. Gunn was an ordained primitive Baptist minister and his arrival in Monroe County, Mississippi, is not definitely known, but the marriage records of Monroe County, show Rev. Gunn performed the marriage ceremony of John D. Gay and Sarah Ann Frailes, May 31, 1842, and this is the first date of any official activities I can find of him in Monroe County records. Some other Monroe County families the Reverend Gunn united in marriage prior to 1850 were: Henderson and Rogers; Ward and Burks; Packer and German; Sanderson and Riddle; Shaw and Thompson; Waitfield and Williams; Moore and Howard.

ch swing by the yellow rose bush at the Valiant home was the couple's favorite for moonlight nights, and cuttings from rose were planted at each of their future ones.

The first of these homes was on the County Road between Chickasaw and Clay counties about one mile from McCondy. Dr. Gunn and his bride arrived there in a wagon drawn by four mules. Roads were deep prairie and the trip from Gibson took six hours. His house included the doctor's office and a small pharmacy. The price of an office call \$1.00 to \$3.50 and a house call, \$2.00 to \$5.00, and delivering a baby, \$25.00. Christ Brand was Dr. Gunn's first delivery. Drug salesmen made regular calls to bring the best medicines, and usually arrived at 11:30 A.M. knowing that an invitation to a good country dinner was likely.

Five children were born in this home, but the oldest, Jessie Conner, and the youngest, Myrtle Jean, died of pneumonia in infancy. Three remaining girls were Mary Frances, Margaret and Ruth Carolyn. Frances married Fred I. Magee, Computer Analyst at Sandia Atomic Weapons, and lives in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Her children are Myrtle Maude, Fred Jr. and Margaret Anne. Margaret Gunn never married but had a successful career teaching first grade in Boston, Corinth, Clarksdale and Okolona. She married Frank Porter Foster, her high school sweetheart from Okolona, and lives in Clarksdale where Frank served terms as a Clerical Clerk of Coahoma County. Their children are Hilda Gunn (Dinnie), Frank Jr. (Dy), Mark Sherman and Stephen (Pal).

When Ruth, the youngest of the Guinn children, went to college, Miss Mary was lonely, and Dr. Gunn's country practice was more and more difficult. They decided to move to Okolona where they enjoyed a full and happy life centered around family, friends and friends. Miss Mary visited daily with her sisters, Sally McClesky and Nettie. Emma Lynn came by often to keep one up to date on happenings at McCondy and Trebloc.

Myrtle Conner Gunn died in 1962 and Dr. Gunn died in 1973.

Dr. Gunn Foster and Maxine Linn have remained close friends and are recalling childhood memories of growing up, such as:

The sandy bottomed pool at the Guinn's was the whole neighborhood swam every except Sunday; the flocks of wild ducks were those that visited the pool in winter; the lake that sunned himself in the Spring with sweet gum limb overhanging the water; a patch of white violets at the woods end of the pool that made a magic spot; fishing with our black friends; Shooting turtle heads with a .22 rifle; going possum hunting with the Nichols boys; gathering wild plums and berries for jams, jellies and pies; attending the up-to-date McCondy Methodist church where we had a larger Epworth League than most of the town churches; dedicated school teachers like Mr. Cameron, Carolyn Clark, Bessie Spain, Wilkins, Eugenia Gray, and J.C. Brister always gave us a good background for living and set a good example for living.

The all-time favorite story concerns the fourth week of July revival. At a night

Lundy was born November 17, 1841, in Tuscaloosa County, Alabama. In 1859, Lundy left home to work as a clerk in a dry goods store in Aberdeen, Mississippi. In 1860 he clerked for Clark and Gillespie in Egypt, Mississippi. In May 1861, with his brothers, Silas and Oscar, he entered the Confederate Army as a private and advanced to the rank of 2nd Lieut. by the end of the war.

Lundy was six feet four inches tall, with a light complexion, gray eyes and light hair. By his own admission, "he loved to dance" and as a youth his joy in parties was a worry to his parents and his uncle Parson Gunn. Lundy's parents were Radfird Madison Gunn and Stacy Floyd Greene Gunn of Sumter County, Alabama.

He fought and/or was present in the following battles: First Manasses, Leesburg, Savage Station, Malvin Hill, Md. Heights, Sharpsburg, Fredericksburg, Chichamauga, Knoxville, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg (where he was wounded), Spottsylvania, May 8th and May 12th, Wilderness (where he was wounded), Cold Harbor, Petersburg, Benyville and Bell Grove.

He returned to his father's home after the war and with his brother, Oscar, he took up his studies under his Uncle Ezekiel Greene, who lived a short distance from his father's farm in Chickasaw County, Mississippi. Lundy gave up studying to win the hand of Miss Elizabeth Terry Brandon. They were married on the eve of October 17, 1865, by his uncle, Robert Bowling Gunn.

Lundy and Elizabeth lived near the Primitive Baptist Church and he farmed with his father until the winter of 1874. At that time he moved his family of six children along with some other families in the area, to Buckatunna in Wayne County, Mississippi. In Wayne County he was engaged in the merchantile and Naval Store business. On January 10, 1888, he accepted a position as Land Agent with the Mobile and Ohio R.R. In January of 1890 he returned his family of 13 children to his father's farm in Chickasaw County which he had purchased. At that time he planned to remain in Chickasaw County, but he moved his family to Waynesboro in 1898.

In 1912 Elizabeth died and Lundy sold his property and resided with his son, Radfird Brandon Gunn.

On April 21, 1923, Lundy Gunn died at the home of his daughter, Bessie Wetherbee, in Shubuta, Mississippi. He was buried in Waynesboro, Mississippi, beside his beloved Elizabeth.

GUNN, RADFIRD MADISON

F312

Radfird Madison Gunn was born October 2, 1814, and died February 5, 1906. He was the son of Radfird and Sylvia Reid Gunn. Radfird married Stacy Floyd Greene in Sumter County, Alabama, on November 21, 1837. Stacy's sister Frances Norris Greene had also married Radfird's brother Robert Bowling "Parson" Gunn. Stacy Floyd was born March 12, 1882, and died March 12, 1882. She was the daughter of Daniel and Stacy Andrews Greene.

Radfird farmed in Chickasaw County and was also in business with his brother Robert Bowling Gunn. In 1861 he was elected as representative to the Mississippi State Legislature with J.T. Griffin.

Radfird and Stacy had six children: (1) Silas Richard, was born August 8, 1838. He entered Oxford University to study medicine in 1857 and graduated in 1860. He settled in Baldwin County, Alabama, to practice until the War Between the States. Dr. Silas Gunn was the assistant surgeon of the 17th Mississippi Regiment.

Silas died while the regiment was encamped around Leesburg, Virginia, on February 6, 1862. His uncle Dr. James M. Greene, Chief Surgeon of the 17th, returned his body to Chickasaw County to be buried in the Gunntown Cemetery.

(2) Radfird Greene was born on May 9, 1840, in Alabama. He married Molly Peel in 1861. Radfird farmed with his father until 1862, at which time he joined his brothers Lundy and Oscar in the 17th regiment. He died of wounds received in battle in 1863.

(3) Lundy Reid Gunn was born on November 17, 1841, and died April 21, 1923. He married Elizabeth Terry Brandon October

in Alabama and died April 22, 1923. She married William Potts Gillespie, Jr., June 26, 1860. They had according to the 1900 census sixteen children, but only records on thirteen have been found.

(5) Oscar Diego was born September 8, 1844, and died ?. He married Hattie Brandon on April 30, 1868. Oscar served in the 17th Mississippi regiment with his brothers. He returned to Chickasaw County after the war and took up his studies with his uncle, D.E. Greene. Oscar became a physician. Oscar and Hattie had four children. Oscar and his family moved from Chickasaw County to Reid, Oklahoma.

Radford Madison Gunn and his wife Stacy Greene Gunn are buried in the Gunntown Cemetery near Egypt, Mississippi. Also buried there are their children, Dr. William, Mary Josephine and her husband Silas Potts Gillespie, Jr.

GUNN, ROBERT BOWLING

F313

Robert Bowling Gunn, known as Parson Gunn was born July 12, 1805 in Brunswick County, Virginia and was the son of Radford Madison and Sylvia Reid Gunn. He married Francis Norris Greene, daughter of Daniel E. and Stacy Andrews Greene, in 1835 in Sumter County, Alabama. Frances was born in 1818 and died in 1906.

Parson Gunn was an ordained Primitive Baptist minister. They did not believe in a paid ministry so their preachers had to have other methods of making a living. They preached because they felt themselves called.

Parson Gunn was a business man. He and his brother conducted a general merchandise business known as R.B. & R.M. Gunn. They bought the business from Ewing Bro. and after some years they sold it to Barker, Parish and Co. In addition to being a merchant he was a planter. His plantations lay west of Egypt, Mississippi.

His arrival in Monroe County is not definitely known but records show he performed a marriage there in 1842. He is shown in the 1850 Monroe County Census with his wife and four children. The New Hope Primitive Baptist Church at Hatley, Mississippi in 1848 had the name of the Reverend R.B. Gunn listed as one of the officials of the church. The church in Aberdeen was erected where the present Catholic Church is now located. The property was purchased in 1852 from E.J. Arthur of the town of Columbia and State of South Carolina.

In the 1860 Census they were in Chickasaw County with three children. They moved to Chickasaw County with other members of the Gunn family and established another primitive Baptist Church. Soon a school was erected and the striving settlement became known as Gunn Village. It was located near Egypt, Mississippi.

Parson and Mrs. Gunn had the following children: (1) Ann Louisa born 1836 died 1873 and she married P.H. Haughton, (2) William Reid born 1838 died 1907, married first Victoria Gillespie, second Mollie Peel, (3) Fannie born 1853 died 1932 married Adam (4) Ida Roberts born 1856 died 1897

married Amos H. Richardson, (5) India E. born 1846 died 1864 did not marry, (6) Fannie B. born 1848 died 1851, (7) Fannie Id born 1850 died 1851, (8) Clara C. born 1851 died 1859. In the 1900 Census Frances Gunn is listed as having nine children with two living at that time so there was probably another child that died young. There were two small children buried at Muldon, Mississippi with the father and mother of Parson Gunn that possibly could have been one Frances and Parson Gunn's children.

Parson Gunn died October 4, 1880 and is buried in the Gunntown Cemetery in Chickasaw County near Egypt, Mississippi. His wife Frances and two infant children are also buried there.

GUNN, DR. WILLIAM REID GUNN

Doctor William Reid Gunn, the son of Parson Gunn was born October 23, 1838, in Alabama. He died August 14, 1907, in Chickasaw County, Mississippi, and is buried in the Gunntown Cemetery near Egypt, Mississippi. His first wife was Victoria Gillespie the daughter of William Potts Gillespie, Sr. They had one child, William B. Gunn born in 1861 and died in 1930. William B. married Zadie Greene, daughter of Daniel E. and Elizabeth (Betty) Jenkins Greene. After the death of Victoria, Dr. Gunn married Mary (Mollie) Peel, the daughter of James Addison and Matilda Denard Abbott Peel. Dr. Gunn and Mary had two children: (1) Mary Peel born 1880 and (2) Clara (Tallie) E. who married J.H. Baskin.

The following was taken from a paper in Aberdeen, Mississippi: We deeply regret to announce the death on Wednesday evening, the 14th inst, at his residence near Egypt, of Dr. W.R. Gunn, who had been for over 40 years our friend and subscriber. He was a grand man in every particular; a gentleman of the old school, pure at heart, polished in manners, learned and talented, a citizen the State could ill afford to lose; a friend and neighbor whose loss is well nigh irreparable. He will be greatly missed and mourned by all who knew him.

HALEY FAMILY

John Haley was born in Tennessee June 1, 1831; died February 7, 1895, at age 64. He married Eliza (Liza) Ellis, born December 11, 1833, in Alabama; died February 15, 1911, age 78. They were married in Egypt, Chickasaw County, Mississippi, during the Civil War by R.B. Gunn, pastor of the Primitive Baptist Church. They had a farm near Prairie, Mississippi. John Haley was a well borer in Egypt and Prairie, the machinery drawn by horses. He also had a grocery store at Prairie. This description of John Haley was given by a granddaughter: "John Haley was a blond, weighed over 200 pounds, was quick tempered, loved young people, played violin for them to dance at socials, good church mem-

ber and had lots of friends. He died in Egypt, Mississippi, and was buried there, his old home, among old friends. One winter after he moved to Houlka, he went back to Egypt to bore a well. While there, he took pneumonia and died. The weather was so cold and bad, no one in the family was able to attend his funeral except his son Oscar. Oscar rode a horse to Okalona in freezing weather and then took the train from there to Egypt where the funeral was held. Eliza is buried in Redland Cemetery. John and Eliza moved to Houlka area into a house on Marion Hill."

Their children: 1. Nancy (Nannie) Lee Haley born June 1, 1864, in Egypt, Mississippi, married Samuel Jackson Staten; 2. John Oliver (Oll) Haley, born 1868 Egypt, Mississippi, married 1888 Catherine Matilda Young, daughter of William Terrell Young and Eliza Sims; 3. William Potts (Buck) Haley, born 1866, married Maggie Jones; 4. Oscar Haley, born ca 1874, married Minnie Armstrong; 5. Beulah Haley, born ca 1869; died ca 1873; 6. Victoria Haley, born in Egypt, Mississippi, died of pneumonia, age 6 weeks.

John Oliver Haley, born 1868, is my grandfather. He married Catherine "Bunch" Young, January 25, 1888. She was born August 30, 1863, died August 30, 1945. All of their children were born in Chickasaw County, Mississippi, on Marion Hill near old Houlka. Their children: 1. Tom May (or A.) Haley named for Dr. Tom A. Williams. He died at age 7 and is buried at Gershorn (Williams) Cemetery; 2. Phillip Rush Haley, born February 22, 1890, married Lessie Clement; 3. William Walker Haley, named for Dr. William Walker of Houlka. Died as an infant; 4. Charles Preston Haley, born January 25, 1893; 5. Estelle Eliza Haley, born August 12, 1897, married William T. Edwards. They live in Tampa, Florida (1984); 6. Lucille Laska (Lute) Haley, married Willis Wyatt; 7. Stillborn child (was to have been named Robert Oliver Haley).

Charles Preston Haley, born 1893, died August 3, 1984, was my father. He married Helen Claire Henderson, daughter of Tignal Jones Henderson and Lillian Ware. They were married September 18, 1920, in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

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GUNNTOWN

At the time of the Civil War there existed a thriving community along the Chickasaw- Monroe County line extending two miles on either side of the Aberdeen and Houston road. The settlement was called Gunntown but the Gunn family was not among first settlers. Chickasaw County tax records prior to 1850 show four families owning this property; William P. Gillespie, Sr., Allen Carr, Joel McLendon, and Dr. James M. Gillespie. The land was probably laid out by one of the land companies for the tracts were usually half a mile north and south, and two or more miles east and west. W. P. Gillespie owned the south part, Allen Carr and Joel McLendon the middle, and Dr. James Gillespie the north. All the homes were in Chickasaw County probably because the eastern (Monroe County) reaches of each plantation were the heavy, black prairie soils, then so remarkably fertile, but unpleasant to live on.

In 1852 The Reverend Robert Bolling Gunn bought the Carr lands and his brother, Radfird Madison Gunn, the south part of the McLendon property. The Gunn brothers had married sisters, Frances and Stacy Greene, and their mother, Stacy, and brother, Ezekial, made their homes on the west of Madison's purchase. The history of this family is recorded elsewhere and not the subject of this tract. Our purpose is to record where the families lived in relation to each other, and some recollections of the homes and other structures in Gunntown.

Number 1 on the map indicates the residence of William Steele Gillespie, a son of Dr. James. It was somewhat further west than indicated, across Redbud Creek. The home was burned in 1863 by Gen. Smith's federal troops.

Number 2 locates Dr. James M. Gillespie's house. It is thought to have faced south toward the Aberdeen and Houston road. After the war a home for another Gillespie son, Jim, was built just a little southwest of the fathers. Dr.

Gillespie's house stood into this century but was generally unoccupied and finally abandoned.

Fifteen marks the home of Mary Gillespie and McDuff Greene. Mary's father, the doctor, gave her this half section when she married. This house still stood in my childhood. It was entered through a spacious porch to the north. A hall divided the front two rooms and across the back, were three smaller rooms. I am told that there were finished rooms in the half story. West of the drive up to the house was a lovely pear orchard that outlasted the house. It is said that peaches, plums, and other fruit trees, shorter lived than pears, originally occupied the east side of the drive. The house was not kept in repair and eventually was abandoned.

Three marks Joel McLendon's house. Madison Gunn bought this place later and the house may have been occupied by some of his children. The house was last occupied by the Fullers who, with Mrs. Fuller's brothers, bought the property about 1900. Lack of upkeep destroyed this house, also.

Number four was the Madison Gunn home. As a child this was my home for five years, and it, the McDuff Greene home, and the church, are the only structures I actually remember. My father said that this house had been built by the craftsmen who built the trestles for the Mobile and Ohio Railroad. Two facts support this story. The time is right - 1852 - and some of the methods of structure are different from those usually found in homes. The porch pilasters were true structural members, not just sham as usually found.

The Madison Gunn house faced east and was entered from a porch twenty-two by twelve feet. At each outer corner, three paneled wooden columns supported a gabled roof. Matching them in the wall were the above mentioned pilasters. Rather narrow, double doors, surrounded by side and top lights, gave entry to a hall about twelve feet wide and forty-four feet long. On each side of

this hall were two rooms, twenty-two feet square. Opposite the entry, matching doors opened to a tee hall that was latticed at the south end and had a door in the north end. Two large rooms and one small one opened west of this hall. The detached, brick-floored kitchen was about fifteen feet from the south end of this hall.

As you entered the front hall, a graceful stair rose along the right (north) wall to a balcony the width of the hall at the west end. From there a steeper stair gave access to one of the most interesting features of this house. A ballroom, nearly sixty feet long and fifteen feet wide occupied the half story. Like all the walls it was plastered and over the years, people had autographed the walls with names, dates, and poetry.

On entering the front hall, the room to the left (south) must have been the parlor for there was a remnant of a lovely cornice that I remember. It is said that there was also a matching medallion in the center. The room west of the parlor is thought to have been the dining room, for it was nearest the kitchen, but no door connected it to the parlor. Other rooms are presumed to have been bedrooms. It is said that the second on the right (north) of the front hall was used in later years by Dr. Oscar Gunn, Madison's son, for an office. It opened into the back hall giving access to the door at the north end of the back hall. This room contained the only closets in the house - three that extended under the stair. Tradition says they were added for Dr. Gunn to have a place in which to lock his medicines.

Another remarkable aspect of this house was that it is said to have had running water from its erection. The small room off the back hall was the bath. It is not known how this early system worked but I remember a huge castiron lavatory believed to have been part of the original fixtures. The cistern to supply water was about 150 feet south of the back hall.

This house shares features with two still standing, Waverly, and the Sykes Old Homestead. All were built about the same time. All had the same style doors, window and door facings. The Sykes house is similar in that it is a modification of the tee plan, and the entry doors and lights are the same.

Five locates the Ezekiel Greene house. It stood into this century and was occupied as a tenant house. Its location on a substantial rise permitted a cellar, rare in this area at that time, that still marks where the house stood.

The matriarch, Stacy Greene, lived where the number six shows on the map. When the families first moved to this site some of her children were still living with her. The house is said to have been smaller than other Gunntown houses. It stood into the early years of this century and was used as a tenant house. I have not found where Mrs. Greene owned adjacent land more than the two acres on which the house stood but she paid tax on six or eight slaves. Shortly before her death she deeded the house and its two acres to a daughter, Louisa Cason.

Seven marks the home of Parson Robert B. Gunn, "Marse Robert" to many. My information comes from recollections of India Carlisle Sykes, a granddaughter of Parson, Bessie Porter Howell, a close, life-long friend of India's and Sally Richardson (another granddaughter) who often visited in the home, and Minerva King Bailey, a Negress who, in her 104 years of life, never lived more than two miles from the house. It must have been, originally, the Allen Carr home for it faced north, toward the Aberdeen and Houston road, the only road nearby when Carr settled on the place. A porch extended around three sides, and possibly four. Cross halls divided the four large downstairs rooms. Two stairs, one in one of the halls and one from one of the porches, gave access to several rooms in the half story. The house was built high off the ground providing space, while not a true

cellar, for storage. The story of the burning of this historic building about 1914 is another interesting tale.

The Gunntown Primitive Baptist Church occupied site eight. It was a large, rectangular, plain building without a porch of any kind but with a half-hexagon apse or recess at the pulpit (east) end. The only ornamentation was pilasters, similar to those on the Madison Gunn house, at each corner. Parson and his son, Dr. William Reid Gunn, are the only known white pastors to serve this church. However, blacks had always been members of the church and Parson ordained a former slave, William Henry Gunn, to serve his race after the war. The acre occupied by the church was deeded to the black church when no longer used by the whites. In the late thirties, the building being in bad repair, it was dismantled and a smaller structure erected from the materials.

Dr. William Reid Gunn, "Dr. Bill", built his home at site nine. It is said to have had four main rooms divided by a hall, downstairs and more bedrooms in a half story. This house burned about 1920.

Sometimes called the "Three G Cemetery" (Gunns, Greenes, and Gillespies), the community graveyard occupies ten. A handsome iron fence still surrounds this lovely site. The first burial was 1854, "Little Charlie Riddle". These families were strong supporters of the Confederacy and several casualties of that struggle lie here. Especially touching is the marker for four of Dr. Gillespie's sons who died in or as a result of the war, and Dr. Silas Gunn, Madison's son, whose uncle, Dr. J. M. Greene, brought his body back from Leesburg, Virginia, for interment among his kin.

Eleven denotes the location of the Gunntown school. It is said to have been a building of two large rooms with a chimney between furnishing heat to both. The school was considered excellent and young people boarded with the Gunntown families to be able to attend.

Mr. Carey lived at number twelve. He married one of the daughters of Stacy & Daniel Greene. Mr. Carey was the schoolmaster who gave the Gunntown school it's high reputation.

Thirteen marks the home of the William Potts Gillespie family. William, Sr. moved here very early, having served in the War of 1812 and been a courier for Gen. Jackson in the Indian wars. Until plowed several years ago, spring flowers marked the location of this home but I have never heard a discription of it or how it disappeared.

Susan, wife of W. P. Gillespie, Sr. died before the Gunntown cemetery was begun and was buried at fourteen. Apparently, at least two others, probably children, and her husband were later interred here. The markers have recently been moved.

DEDICATED TO MY CHILDREN / THEIR OFFSPRING FROM GENERATI TO GENERATION:

In attempting a review of the past I have three objects in view, namely; First, to acquaint you with some of your forebearers, a partial sketch of my life, and my view of the Doctrine of God our Savior, in regard to the plan of Salvation, that you may know upon what I base my hope of a life of immortality, beyond this vale of sorrow.

My great-grandfather, William Gunn, married Hannah White, originally from Scotland, and settled in Brunswick County, Virginia. Born unto those; William, George, Radfird (my grandfather), Richard, Selas, Peter Reid, and Sylvia.

Radfird Gunn and Sylvia Reid married in 1796 in Brunswick. Born unto them Hannah White, William Boatright, Peter Reid, Robert Bowling, Richard, Silas Lundy, Radfird Madison (my father) and Louise Olive.

Hannah White married Benjamin H. Fuller, in Tennessee, in 1818. William Boatright married Cynthia Hester, Tuscaloosa County, Alabama in 1825. Peter Reid married Mahala Hill, Tuscaloosa County, Alabama in 1827, Robert Bowling married Frances Norris Greene, Sumter County, Alabama in 1835, Richard Gunn never married. Silas Lundy married Lucinda Norris, Radfird Madison married Stacy Floyd Greene in Sumter County, Alabama in 1837. Louise Olive married James Lyon in Tuscaloosa County, Alabama in 1835.

Born unto Radfird Madison Gunn and Stacy F. Greene; Silas Richard, August 8, 1838. Died in War in 1862. Radfird Greene, May 8, 1850 married Mollie Peel in 1861, Died from wounds received in war in 1863. Lundy Reid, November 17, 1841, Tuscaloosa County, Alabama, Married Elizabeth Terry Brandon, October 17, 1865. Mary Josephine February 7, 1843 married William P. Gillespie, June 26, 1860, Oscar Diego September 8, 1844 married Hattie Brandon, April 30, 1868, Fanny Ida, May 1865 died in infancy. I have no record of my mothers family, therefore, I will write from memory.

Daniel E. Greene and Stacy Andrews had the following children born unto them; Betsy married James McKeown, Nancy married James McMillan, Francis Norris married Robert Bowling Gunn, Charlotte never married. Melvina married Manes Lewis. Stacy Floyd married Radfird Madison Gunn. Louisa married Mr. Field, was left a widow and married Joseph Cason, Martha married John L. Gary, Burrel never married. McDuffie married Mary Gillespie, Daniel E. married Betty Jenkins, Dr. James married Ophelia Walton. (Elizabeth)

Your mother's parents were Logan D. Brandon, born September 29, 1803; Sarah Ann Haughton, born July 11, 1819. They were married in 1843. Born unto them; Elizabeth Terry, July 9, 1844, Nathaniel T., January 14, 1846, Julia H., April 16, 1847, married Thomas Drake November 20, 1872, Lucy Ann, January 1, 1849, died young. Harriet, February 24, 1851, married Dr. C. D. Gunn, April 30, 1868. Logan D. Marchil, 1855 married Lulu Hood, November 13, 1889. The Brandon and Haughton families were among the first people in this country, wish I could trace their history farther back.

I was married to Elizabeth Terry Brandon in Monroe County, Mississippi, on October 17, 1865. Born unto us: Radfird Brandon, October 13, 1866. He married Bessie Scott, February 9, 1898, Monroe County, Mississippi. Mary Josephine, November 15, 1867 in Chickasaw County, Miss., married Edgar L. Gaines November 17, 1891 in Mississippi. Sallie L. Floyd, December 12, 1869, Chickasaw County, Miss., married Daniel W. Swetman, June 1904 in Wayne County, Mississippi, Ida Mae Junell, 1871 in Chickasaw County, Mississippi, married Henry B. Gillespie January 9, 1896 in Chickasaw County, Mississippi; Julia Brandon September 11, 1872 in Chickasaw County, Mississippi married McDuff Greene, December 20, 1894 in Mississippi. Robert Madison, March 24, 1874, Mississippi, died October 29, 1875; Lundy Reid, November 15, 1876 in Wayne County, Mississippi, died December 1, 1881. William Richard, March 3, 1878 in Wayne County, Mississippi, married Frankie Mullins

April 1, 1902, died April 30, 1905. Bessie Reid, November 22, 1879 in Wayne County, Mississippi married Edward L. Wetherbee, November 15, 1900 in Wayne County, Miss.; Lundiena, September 8, 1881 in Chickasaw County, Mississippi married John A. Wetherbee May 23, 1900 in Wayne County, Mississippi; Logan Diego August 19, 1883, Wayne County, Mississippi died December 2, 1893. Daughter stillborn June 28, 1885 Wayne County, Mississippi; Madison Douglas, September 19, 1886 Wayne County, Miss., married Blanche Odom, June 19, 1907 in Jefferson County, Alabama. This maybe of some use to you and your children in the coming years.

In the dedication of this article I promised to acquaint you, next with some of my past life. This will be the most difficult part of my task. I was reared by Primitive Baptist parents who taught their children to be honest and truthful, kind to everyone, and to live a moral, upright life, thereby gain the good-will of all with whom they came in contact, and fulfill our moral obligation to our Creator. This should be the most impressive duty of all parents. Parents fall far short of their duty if they do not teach their children their moral obligation to God. This is the meaning of the Scripture, "Bring your children up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." Notwithstanding the admonition and training I received I was a bad, disobedient boy, I reveled in mischief, would curse and swear, tell falsehoods, for all of which I was chastized and admonished to refrain from such conduct. I was sent to get off by myself and yell as loud as I could, as though something terrible was the matter with me, to see my mother and others run to see what the trouble was, and then laugh at them. I was in all manner of mischief yet I was guilty of nothing criminal. Was always among the leaders in mischief. Never liked to fight, but when I was mad I would strike with anything I could reach. My elder brother irritated me on one occasion, I jerked up a hatchet, he ran, and had he not turned around the corner of the house as soon as he did the hatchet would have struck him which I threw with all my strength. For this I received the proper chastisement, I did not profit by the tuition I had as I should. I was told that God did not love bad children but I was afraid of him whom I was serving-- the devil. I would often awake from sleep with a scream, fearing something would catch me. I was told the "BAD MAN" would catch me if I was not a better boy, and it was him I feared. I mention these things, to show that I was in a state of nature. I was considered a good boy in school as far as books were concerned. I had some ambition and wanted to stand at the head of my class, which I invariably did, and for this I was liked by my teachers. When I grew to the age of fifteen years, my parents bought me a suit of ready-made clothing, the first I had owned. My mother had servants, and with their assistance, would weave the cloth and make her boys clothing; the first I had, they were very small. After donning my store-bought suit I was ready to go among the girls, and attend dances all night, many times, and as the old adage runs, "go home with the girls in the morning." Usually, I was the life of the gathering, I delighted in prompting for the Cotillion and Virginia Reel. My frolics never interfered with my work. My father required his boys to work, attend school during the week and work on Saturdays. We thought this rather severe, but he was right, we were sure not to get into mischief. I thank him for it. It taught me to like work and now at my ripe old age, I still like it. All boys should be required to work; it will strengthen their constitution. My father owned slaves, but required his boys to work, especially in cultivation and gathering the crops. My eldest brother, Silas Richard, entered Oxford University to study medicine in 1857 and graduated from there in 1860. He settled in Baldwin County, Alabama to practice his profession until the war between the States. My next oldest, Radfird Greene, attended to my father's business. I took a clerkship in a dry good store in Aberdeen, Mississippi in 1860. My youngest brother, Oscar Diego, did chores around home. In 1860 I clerked for Clark and Gillespie, in Egypt, Mississippi. During this time I met your mother. My acquaintance ripened into love. I visited her and pressed my suit. She was sixteen years of age. She very wisely declined. Her image was ever before me, as the sequel will show. In April, 1861, with my brothers, Dr. Silas and Oscar, I entered the Confederate Army, my brother Radfird joining us in 1862. We were organized into the 17th Mississippi Infantry. Our company was the "Buena Vista Rifles" Co. A 17th Mississippi Regiment. We reached Virginia in time to engage

in the first battle of Manassa. While on our route there by railroad an accident occurred which was very shocking indeed. The locomotive pulling our train blew up. Two of our company were riding in the cab at the time. One, Jogh Hendrix, was instantly killed; the other William Pearson, was very badly scalded. He soon recovered and joined us in Virginia, to be killed later in battle. (copy missing) were detained. After the Battle of Manass our Command moved up the Shenandoah Valley to Leesburg, where we killed, drowned and captured most of the Federals we encountered. We encampd around Leesburg for some time. While here my brother, Dr. Silas M. Gunn, died. He was assistant Surgeon of the 27th Mississippi Regiment at the time. My uncle, Dr. James H. Greene, who was Surgeon of the regiment, attended him. /Believing my brother was past recovery, he secured a furlough and took his body to Chickasaw County, Mississippi, and entered it in the family graveyard. It was hard indeed, to have to give up one so beloved, so noble and useful.

I will pass over the vicissitudes of the war in which we were engaged. Though there was something fascinating, to me about the camp life. I was stout and healthy and always on the alert for fun and frolic. Yet, at times a solemnity would overcome me, and in my quiet moments, I would reflect upon my future existence, and realized that I was a sinner and needed a Savior, and was made to cry to God for mercy. I flew to the Las of Justification, would read my pocket Testament, and resolve to work myself into the favor of God. I found no relief. Would return to my sports with the hope of dispelling the awful feeling get relieved of the burden I was carrying. Thus in travail, I labored, until the year 1863. On a memorable occassion (cannot recall the exact date), while we were lying behind some breast works along the Rapidann River in Virginia, I was gathering some foliage from the trees (it had rained and ground was damp) upon which to spread my blanket, I trust God visited me by His Spirit and relieved me of the burden I had been carrying so long. My soul overflowed with joy. I felt so relieved I sang praises to His Holy name in these words: "I love Jesus, yes, I do. Jesus smiles and loves me too." In trust, I was created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God before ordained, that I should walk in them make a new creature in Christ Jesus. I was killed to the love of sin, and abhorred all my sinful ways. I loved God because He first loved me and showed His loving kindness to me. My first thought, after this revelation, was to impart the glad news to someone in whom I had confidence. I saw Cousin W. Gunn sitting on the breastworks and went immediately to him and related what I had experienced. He replied, "Your parents will be glad to hear it." I was a little disappointed as I expected him to rejoice with me. After this all fear or danger seemed to banish from me, so much so that on one occasion, while our command was behind breastworks I was walking about while shots from the enemy's guns were flying about and Cousin William remarked to me, "You should not expose yourself so." I replied that I did not feel that a Yankee bullet could hit me. His reply was "Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God." What a shudder came over me as I realized my utter recklessness in doing as I had; I never was guilty of such again. The God of Abraham, Issac and Jacob has been my shield and hiding place since. He preserved my life through the dangers of four years of war (in which I never lost a day's duty) and through dangers both seen and unseen, to this good hour.

After the war closed I returned to my father's home. I was then twenty-three years and five months old. My first thought was to complete my studies, and look after my father's business. With my younger brother, Oscar, we took up our studies under Uncle Ezeliel Green, who lived but a short distance from my father's home. In the meantime, I had renewed my visits to your mother, the "girl I left behind me." The old love was kindled into a flame which consumed all desires for my studies. My whole being was so absorbed in winning my first love that I told my father and mother that I could not study. I gave up my books and continued my visits. After visiting her about two months, I was embolded to ask her to marry me. She consented and on the evening of the 17th of October 1865 we were made man and wife by that good old Baptist minister, and my uncle in the flesh, Robert Bowling Gunn. Without home or money, we entered upon life's journey, happy in each other's love. We adapted ourselves to the circumstances surrounding us, obeying the Biblical injunction,

replenish and multiply the earth, as our family record will show. Our hardships were many, in providing for our children, but God, in whom we trusted, supplied us with food and raiment. No truer and more faithful wife was ever given to man-- so thoughtful of my wants and wishes. We lived near the Primitive Baptist Church, to which my parents belonged and my uncle was pastor. I attended preaching regularly. I also attended before I entered the Army, but then the preaching was as sounding brass or tinkling cymbal-- now it was quite different. It was, as Paul expressed it, "the power of God to the believer." I loved the services, and each sermon was, seemingly, addressed to me. I had a desire to join the church, but did not feel worthy to worship with so good a people, as I considered those old Baptists to be. The Spirit against the flesh and the flesh against the spirit. As the Apostle described it, "I could not do the things that I would." This warfare has existed since, and will continue to exist until I am laid to rest. I knew all were expecting me to ask for membership, for I wrote home while in the army what I hoped the Lord had done for me. I battled with my impressions until August, 1868 when I was made willing to ask for a home with people I considered worshipped God in spirit and in truth. I was received and baptized into full fellowship. I received a peace of mind which alone comes from being buried with Christ in baptism. I was farming with my father and continued to enjoy the sweet meetings we had, the fellowship of the church until the winter of 1874, when our family of six children in company with each other, moved to Buckatunna, Mississippi, Wayne County, and engaged in the merchantile and navael store business, which continued until 1880. During most of those years we had a good business, but were unfortunate in having two fires which crippled very much. Our business decreased so much that I left my partners to carry it on and I accepted a position with the Mobile and Ohio R. R., as Land Agent, January 10, 1888. We closed our business in 1889. In January 1890, I moved my family to my father's home in Chickasaw County, Mississippi which I had bought. I held my position with the Land Company, expecting to resign my position soon, join my family and make my permanent home in Chickasaw County. Man proposes, but God disposes. In 1898 I moved my family to Jaynesboro, Mississippi. I bought a home and with your mother's good and wise counsel endeavored to complete the education of our children. In 1907, the last of our children married. We were, then left alone. Five years later, on the 20th day of October, 1912, God was fit to deprive me of your mother's companionship, who was all my life to me. I cannot express to you the pangs of sorrow and grief I have endured, or will you ever know without experience. Although God took her unto Himself I will never fail to thank Him for giving her to me of my lovely children. Not being able to have any of my children live with me, I sold my home and am living principally with my oldest son. I am a lone pilgrim on the face of the earth, no place to call my own. I have many regrets, for sins of omission and commission, in the past. Have not lived as I should have done and ask God if consistent with His will, to forgive me of every wrong, and give me grace to enable me to live nearer Him in the remainder of my days in this sin cursed world, and when He calls me home, may I ascend on the wings of His love to that life of imortality beyond this vale of sorrow. May this be the happy lot of all who may read this, all who are dear to me by the ties of nature, and the entire household of faith. I have touched but lightly upon my career of three-quarters of a century. This may, however, give you some idea of my travels. I come now, to the third proposition of this article, which is the most sacred, and the one I wish to more forcibly impress upon your minds. It is very important that we have a proper conception of the Three-in-One God in the salvation of sinners of Adam's race, God the Father, God the Son, The Holy Ghost. God is a sovereign, who has all power; He made the world and all things therein; and has a right to do His will; is above all law and amenable to none, save His own will. Jesus says, "I came not to do mine own will, but the will of Him who sent me." And this is the will of Him who sent me-- of all the Father hath given me I should lose nothing, but raise them up at the last day. We forced to conclude that all the Father gave the Son in the conenant of redemption will at last be housed in Heaven, without the loss of one. God the Father gives, God the Son redeems, and God the Holy Ghost makes manifest to the heirs of promise. This is the rock upon which the prophete and apostles builded. If Christ redeemed the entire human family, the entire human family will be saved in Heaven, less you

make God a liar, for Jesus says, " All the Father giveth I shall come to me." The angel said to Josph, " Fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife, for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost, and she shall bring forth a son and Thou shalt call his name Jesus, for He shall save his people from sins". Is this true? If so why doubt the will of God being perfected through the death and sufferings of our blessed Redeemer? The redemption was not complete without his resurrection. He arose from the grave that He might be conqueror over death, hell and grave. which confirms the Scripture, " He died for our offenses and rose again for our justification. He told His disciple, when they were grieving about His departure from them, " If I go not away the comforter will not come, if I go away I will send the comforter and He will take the things of mine and show them unto thee." He said, " I came to do the Father's will," and when He expired on the cross, He exclaimed, "It is finished," alluding to the redemption price for all the Father had given Him. What agonies He endured that God's elect people should have a home in Heaven; To know God is everlasting life." None beneath the Son save the Father none knoweth the Father save the Son and he to whom the Son will reveal Him." The Scriptures abundantly teach that we know God alone by revelation. We know Him not in pardon and forgiveness of our sins, save by the Holy Ghost. This, the comforter our Savior, promised to send when He went away. And we have the promise that He will abide with us forever. " He that loveth is born of God." Does not love that he may be born but loves because he is born of God. Life always precedes action. Born to the quickening influence of the Holy Spirit Paul said to the Ephesian brethren, "You hate He quickened (made alive) who were dead in trespasses and in sin." The soul that is born of God is dead to sin, made alive to righteousness, abhors sin and wishes to live free from sin. Yet we have the same sinful nature which will not be purified until the resurrection. The doctrine Predestination, election, and final preservation of the saints is so pointedly taught in the Scriptures that they cannot be successfully disputed. When Jesus taught the doctrine, the Populace, said, " they were hard sayings and who can hear them?" Can we expect better now? God says, "What I have purposed shall come to pass." "I am God and beside me there is none other." Paul, an Apostle of Jesus Christ, says, " that the Purpose of God according to election withstand, not of works, but of Him thee calleth." It was said unto Rebecca, "The elder shall serve the younger." As it is written, Jacob have I loved but Esau have I hated. The Apostle Peter says, "Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through sanctification of the Spirit, unto obedience, and sprinkling of the blood of Christ Jesus chosen in Christ before Him in love." Every admonition the Bible is to the children of God and should not be applied to the unregenerate. " The natural men receiveth not the things of the Spirit, for they are foolishness unto him neither can he know them, for they are spiritually discerned. " He that doeth righteous is righteous." made righteous by the quickening influence of the Holy Spirit which comes to everyone of the elect. "By grace are ye saved through faith, and not of yourself, it is the gift of God, not of ours, lest any man should be holy and without blame before Him in love. Having predestinated us unto the adoption of children by Jesus Christ to Himself, according to the good pleasure of His will." Will you consider, for a moment, why God chose His people in Christ before the foundation of the world? You have the answer in the above quotation on the Scripture. " According to the good pleasure of His will." God predestinated everything necessary for the accomplishment of the purpose He had in giving His son to suffer and die the ignominious death of the cross. " and we know that all things work together for good to them that love the Lord, to them who are called according to His purpose. Moreover, whom He did foreknow, then He also called; whom He called them He also justified, and whom He justified, them He also glorified." What shall we say to these things? If God be for us who can be against us? Much more could be written in support of the Doctrine of God's predestination and choice in the salvation of His elect children. What more is necessary to substantiate this God honoring doctrine? Is it not glorious to feel that His electing love has illumined our soul with the thought of our predestination to the adoption of children to the Heavenly family? His promise is that we shall be preserved to an inheritance beyond this vale of tears. " Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, which according to His abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively hope, by the resurrection of Jesus Christ

from the dead, to an inheritance, incorruptible and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in Heaven for you who are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation readily to be revealed in the last time." The apostle Paul, in writing to the Roman brethren, says, "For I am persuaded that neither death nor life, nor angels nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us (the children of God) from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord." I have loved thee with an everlasting love, therefore with loving kindness have I drawn thee. Everlasting has not end, " I know no one can successfully controvert these eternal truths: Election, Predestination and Final Preservation of the Saints. Upon this foundation, my hope of Heaven depends; If you have ever felt the love of God in your heart and made to cry to Him for mercy in sincerity, that love will never be withdrawn, which makes us rejoice in God through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, and to follow Him through evil as well as good report. The Scriptures testify of Him by precept and example-- Baptism, the Sacrement and foot-washing are ordinances of the Church, set up by the God of Heaven, and we do not follow Him all the way unless we observe them. We are strictly admonished to keep ourselves unspotted from the world. Do not let our pride prevent us from worshipping God in the simplicity of the Gospel. I cannot be with you much longer and I wish to admonish you to be kind and affectionate to each other. Communicate with each toher; be sober, truthful and honest. Deal honorably and fairly with all men. " Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." I have no greater joy than to hear my children walk in the truth.

It gives me great pleasure to leave on record, in my declining days, my appreciation of the esteem and affection shown me by my children and their families. Would that I had left a more spotless record for them to emulate. I know your sainted mother would echo these sentiments from Heaven. Ponder them well.

May Grace and Peace from God the Father and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ abide with you. Amen.

Meet your ancestors

Origin of the Gunn families of Mississippi

The volume entitled "Family Chronicle and Kinship Book" in the genealogical collection of the U.S.M. Library contains the following information about the origin of the Mississippi Gunns (in abstracted form). The entire book should be consulted for more details and connections with other families.

The immigrant, William Gunn, came to James City Co., Va. in 1635. His great-grandson, William, who died in 1795 lived in Brunswick Co., Va. and was married to Hannah White. They had three sons who fought in the Revolutionary War. These sons migrated to Crawfordsville, Ga. and to Mississippi. Their sons were named William, George, Richard, Radford, Silas, and Peter. A family history entitled "The Gunns" by Robert R. Gunn of Crawfordsville, Ga. has been published.

Other information about the Gunns concerns another immigrant Thomas Gunn, who came from England to Va. in 1650. His great-grandson, Sterling Gunn, is said to have been the person who fired the first shot from a cannon in the Revolutionary War. He later migrated to North Carolina. His son, Samuel moved to Murfreesboro, Tenn. and then to Tuscaloosa, Ala. by 1821. His son, William Henry Gunn, is the ancestor of the Gunns near Starkville. Four known children of Samuel are William Henry, George, Amanda, and Rebecca.

The Gunns are said to be of Viking descent and moved from the North into England by 870. There are remains of two castles in Scotland which were associated with the early clan of Gunns.

James Stuart Weir, (4) Samuel Henry, b 1838, died in the Civil War, (5) James Wiley, b 1840 who died in the Civil War also, (6) Thomas Irvin, b 1842 who m. Elizabeth B. Huffman, (7) Alfred Marian, b 1844 who m. Nancy Foster Mann, (8) Martha A., b 1846, single, and (9) George, b 1848 who died in Civil War, and (10) Mary Ann, b 1850 who m. George Spain and D. G. Hamner. Will exchange information on the Hortons... Mars. Arthur Horton, Box 465, Grand Prairie, Texas 75056.

FITZRELL: Would like to exchange information with anyone who has knowledge of the Ruben Kittrell family near State Line, Greene Co., Miss. Abner was b. in S.C. about 1816 and his wife, Mary McLain (?) was b. in Ga. about 1822. He probably came to Greene Co. about 1840 as his oldest son was here there about 1841. Lt. Col. (ret.) Arvin L. Small, P.O. Box 217, Beaumont, Miss. 39423 (Families of McLains and variant spellings were found in the following counties in Ga. on the 1820 census: Oglethorpe, Greene, Emanuel, and Columbia. The 1840 index to the Ga. census shows McLain's bill in Oglethorpe, Green, and Emanuel. No Kittrells are listed on either census in any of these counties. However, they may have married in one of these counties and moved to Mississippi to establish their first home. Marriage records of the above counties should be consulted.

THE C U R N S

A William Gunn died in Brunswick County, Virginia, in 1795 but he was not the father of Radford Gunn, born 1777 who married Sylvia Reed (found as Reed in Brunswick court records.) Also, this Radford Gunn is not found in the original records as Radford Madison Gunn, although he apparently had a son, Radford Madison Gunn. His father was William Gunn, Senr. who died between July 26 and September 25, 1797, in Brunswick County, Virginia.

His will is found in Will Bk 6, page 119 (106), Brunswick Co., Va., as follows:

In the name of God Amen I William Gunn of Brunswick County and State of Virginia being weak and low in body do constitute make and ordain this my last Will and Testament as follows, viz.,

I give to my daughter Sarah Huff as much cash as July a negro fellow that is now in the possession of Mr. John Drummond as thought to be worth in the judgment of two Reputable men to her and her heirs forever I give to James Huff six shillings to him and his heirs forever I give to Molly Barker Rose and her future increase.... I give to the orphans of my son William Gunn dead. 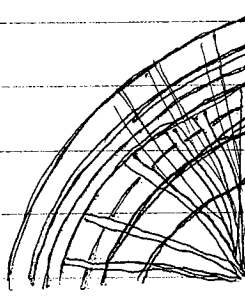
