Notes: JAMES ALDRIDGE SHORT at the age of 3 lost his mother and his grandmother LORA REBECCA (Gould) SHORT who must of loved children because after hers were grown she took Lora Rebecca Short and James Aldridge Short into her home along with her son John Kirkland Short and became a mother and grandmother again. Five years later in 1928 her husband James Henry Short died and she continued to be the perfect mother to her sons children.

The First Baptist Church of Meridian Miss was a dominant factor in the bringing up and rearing along with the superb public school system of Meridian Separate School District. Troop 6 of the Boy Scouts of America sponsored by the First Baptist Church along with aunts, uncles, cousins, teachers, and friends. There were no excuse for not making Honor Roll except for being lazy and a lack of desire.

JAS did in fact graduate from High School-Meridian Junior College-became a NAVAL AVIATOR with duty of flight instructor-with a wife and two children enrolled in 1946 at MISSISSIPPI STATE UNIVERSITY graduating in Accounting in 1947. Worked as an accountant for a company that had up to 300 retail service stations outlets which sold gasoline, diesel, motor oil, drinks, cigarettes. batteries, tires, automotive accessories, beer, snacks, and food. The first position was that of office manager and the last was Treasurer with other duties at the same time and in between.

After moving from Greenwood Miss in 1963 to Hammond La Jim Short began to learn the habit of chasing the little white ball known as GOLF and has a good supply of awards and trophies to show for his efforts.

In 1986 he acquired a IBM PCXT computer and with the help of his brother in law began to a novice computer operator. About the same time his cousin Ben Short (after 50 yr) lapse made contact and the two began compiling family tree data of SHORT-FILBRY-WHITE-SANDERFORD-COVINGTON-ALDRIDGE-ROBERTS-MITCHELL-GOULD-DONALD-RICKOLL-ZIMMER And 32 others. In 1990 while pursuing the GOULD family line in MAINE Jim Short stumbled upon the JOHN and PRISCILLA ALDEN line of MAYFLOWER FAME.

Roots run to Mayflower

A newspaper article piqued Jim Short's interest in genealogy two years ago and he began poking around into his family history — all the way back to Plymouth Rock, the Pilgrims and the Mayflower.

Short's tracing of his family tree branched from his native Mississippi to roots in our country's first Thanksgiving celebration.

Short, a 30-year Hammond resident who had retired from Charter Marketing, marched back to the Meridian, Miss., of the mid-1800s and the name Gould—which was lost in Short's family when a Gould marriage produced three daughters.

One Gould had moved from Maine to Meridian where he became a "Yankee fighting on the Confederate side," Short said.

When Short traveled to Banger, Maine, in 1990, he visited cousins and found a family cemetery in the outlying area.

"I went to check on the Gould family and in the cemetery they had an Alden right next to (the Goulds)," he said, noting that the Alden had married into the Gould family.

The Alden line traced back to John Alden, one of the 100 or so English Puritans who crossed the Atlantic in 1620 in the Mayflower.

In their first autumn, they broke bread in a three-day festival that has come to be popularly known as America's first Thanksgiving, celebrated by Pilgrims and Indians.

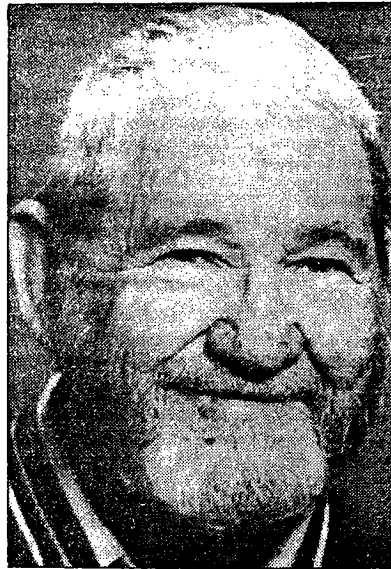
Short later attended a Jackson, Miss., meeting of the Mayflower Society, a group similar to the Daughters of the American Revolution. The society strives to preserve the Pilgrim's past.

His delving into family history led him to discovery of these facts about the first Thanksgiving:

- He comes from hearty stock. Only half of the Mayflower passengers survived the first year.

- In the spring of 1621, the Pilgrims planted 20 acres of corn and six acres of barley and peas. "God be praised, we had a good increase of Indian corn," wrote settler Edward Winslow back to England. "Our barley did indifferent good, but our peas (were) not worth the gathering."

- Their Thanksgiving dinner spanned three days and included 90 Indian guests in a celebration more akin to an

outdoor barbecue than today's family reunion dinners.

- Their victuals consisted of venison (the Indians provided five deer), roast duck, goose, turkey, clams and other shellfish, eels, cornbread, hasty pudding, leeks, watercress, wild plums and dried berries for dessert and wine made with

Short said the early Pilgrim experience held little interest for him before he looked into his personal past.

"The only thing I remembered was those old, tall hats and the black vests," he said. "I couldn't have cared less about the Pilgrims."

But no more.

"The thing that was important about the Mayflower is they signed the Mayflower Compact," he said. "And that's one of the important things about our country that the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence is sort of based on."

Two months after leaving England, 41 adult males on the Mayflower signed the document in Provincetown Harbor, Mass. on Nov. 21, 1620. A month later, they settled permanently at Plymouth, where the compact became the first social contract for a New England colony.

Joe Marvin, an SLU history instructor, said three themes make the first American Thanksgiving memorable: the Pilgrims' view of the harvest as God's providence, their invitation of the Indians and their continuation of an agricultural tradition with roots in Europe.

"What interests me about the original Thanksgiving was the effort that these early folks made to include the Indians in their celebration," he said. "Not only were they thanking God, they were thanking the Indians."

"That's almost unique in North American history."

The Pilgrims saw the befriending of the Indians as a sign of God's intent to establish their settlement.

"The (Thanksgiving) tradition is indigenous to peasant societies," Marvin said. "We tend in the United States to isolate our history, but a harvest festival is a worldwide tradition."

"The American twist to Thanksgiving, of course, is the Pilgrims were very religious, so they were happy to have survived."

A Thanksgiving Chronology

- **1621:** Pilgrims celebrated the earliest American harvest festival in December at Plymouth Rock, Mass.
- **1631:** The Massachusetts Bay Colony marked the first public thanksgiving with a fast day on Feb. 22.
- **1644:** The first Thanksgiving Day in New Amsterdam (New York) celebrated the safe return of Dutch soldiers from a battle with Connecticut Indians.
- **1789:** Over the objections of anti-Federalists, President George Washington proclaimed Nov. 26 as a day of Thanksgiving for the Constitution.
- **1863:** President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed Thanksgiving a national holiday observed on the last Thursday of November.
- **1939:** President Franklin Roosevelt moved Thanksgiving back one week to stimulate Christmas shopping.
- **1941:** Congress set Thanksgiving on the fourth, not the last, Thursday.

!NOTES: MARGARET SANDERFORD was a lifelong Presbyterian. Her favorite magazine was Readers Digest which she read from cover to cover each month. By far her favorite book was the HOLY BIBLE, which she read through each year on a daily basis for over 30 years--you will not find a underline or a mark on any of her Bibles--you could always depend on her memory to locate any scripture passage as she had uncanny memory of everything she read. Of course she started her Bible study with the St James version and progressed through the later verions as they were published. She belonged to the Women of the Church and worked with the young people quite a bit. She was an outstanding Sunday School Teacher and while not teaching attended a Sunday School Class all her life.

Margaret graduated from Meridian High School but did not consider a college education as a must in her life. She was a very lively and tireless person, thrifty in that her talent for sewing made 98% of clothing, made curtains and draperies for her house and crocheted bedspreads, footwarmers for her close kin and friends. She recorded all household expenditures daily and accounted for cost of living data so that a budget was easily maintained mostly on a month to month basis as the sums avaiable was quite slim. She also remembered quite a number of kin and friends on their Birthdays and had a very long Christmas Card mailing list, that was reciprocated almost 100%

Since her husband spent so much of his spare time on the golf course and seemed to enjoy it so much she decided that she might enjoy the fresh air and the exercise that the game provided. To her surprise she adapted well to the game and some female golfer friends she played a respectable game and created quite a circle of golf friends. She was fortunate to being invited to travel with Oak Knoll Country Club friends to distant places to play golf in their airplane and van. Also she with her husband played in the Husband and Wife tournaments of the Mississippi Seniors Golf Assn.

Her heritage was one of giving and by so doing, was on the receiving end of others who had the same spirit of giving.

She expressed the desire of having a CHURCH MEMORIAL SERVICE at First Presbyterian Church which was held two days after graveside rites were preformed. This request was honored and dutiful carried out. The Church was filled to capacity with some mourners having to stand in the aisles which was

Notes for James Henry Short:

JAMES HENRY SHORT was born in Pickens County Alabama close to Nashville Landing Ms. His father James Lowe Short was captured by the Union Army at Vicksburg and was confined at his home as a prisoner of war. James Henry SHORT was apparently quite energetic in that as a young chap he attended what is now Miss State University as one of its first students. He became one of the first employees of G M & O railroad and worked out of Meridian Ms. Since his mother died a year before he married in 1886, and he being the oldest child, his brother Benjamin followed him to Meridian, and it wasn't long before three sisters and a younger brother followed them to Meridian also. Benjamin continued as farmer and primary interested in dairy business and JAMES HENRY SHORT pursued with the railroad and after the loss of one eye went into a type of business as he witnessed on the Railroad of the vendors that sold snacks to the passengers. He decided to vend such items as peanuts, popcorn, bananas, soft drinks from a cart or wagon and finally a truck. Sales of these items were usually less than a dime and most often (5) five cents. With his pleasant disposition and his strong desire to succeed his business became quite large and consisted of several trucks, a large warehouse store, and a crew of sales personnel that branched out to Neshoba County Fair, Lake Miss Fair, Alabama Mississippi Fair in Meridian Cotton States League Baseball concessions at Meridian. His oldest son James Elisha Short established his own business along with the same lines and added snowballs and other items that the customers fell in favor of. His routes were primarily the various grammar and Jr High school and the Cotton Mills that employed large number of people and that were finished their work at a set time. His 2nd son stayed with the business until 1928 when James Henry died, John Kirkland Short then opted to open his own store in downtown Meridian and offered the same type of nickel and dime snacks to a walk-in trade which survived the depression and World War II.

W J ALDRIDGE, who was mentioned in last issue as going to Mountain Valley Springs, Ark. for his health, died a short time after reaching that resort. The trip there exhausted him and he died Sunday night June 25, 1905. The remains were carried to Duck Hill, Ms. where he had formerly lived for interment. Deceased was 34 years of age and leaves a wife and five children. He had been employed by the Illinois Central Railroad in various capacities for many years, the railroad transferred him from Water Valley Ms to Durant in 1904, and was very popular with his associates.

W J ALDRIDGE was the son-in-law of Mr D E ROBERTS, Durant Town Clerk.

The funeral of W J Aldridge at Duck Hill last Tuesday was attended by a number of his comrades and friends from Durant and Water Valley. Being a member of O R C (order of railroad conductors) his comrades took charge of the remains at Memphis Tenn and accompanied them to Duck Hill where the funeral took place in the Baptist Church, Rev T A Moore, officiating. The building was crowded with friends and relatives many of them having known him since childhood, and holding him highest esteem. His remains were LAID TO REST BESIDES HIS MOTHER to await the last call to life and immortality. His grave was literally covered with the fairest flowers that could be had, by hands that were glad to honor the memory of one so thoroughly loved and respected. It was beautiful to see such marked devotion paid to his memory by his fellow craftsmen. The deceased leaves a widow and five little children whose sorrow appeals to sympathizing friends and not in vain.

POLK CEMETERY

Bolivar, Tennessee

COL. EZEKIEL POLK

Born Dec. 7, 1747; Died Aug. 31, 1824

When Polk Cemetery was established in 1845, Col. Ezekiel Polk, who had died almost 22 years earlier, was among the first whose remains were moved to the family resting grounds.

Of particular interest is the lengthy epitaph which Polk wrote when he was 74 years of age, more than two years before his death.
